Pages, May 22.—Victor Hugo died at 1:30 this afternoon. The decease I condition was so manifestly worse this merining that his death was rejected as certain to take place within a few hours. M. Lockroy, the poet's son-in-law, who was in attendance at the death-bad, replied for Hugo, declining with thanks the archbishop's tender, and anying. "Victor Hugo, is expecting death, but he does not desire the services of a priest."

It is reported that Hugo bequeathed his manuscripts to France, and left it to the republic to select a burial place for his funeral.

[Victor Hugo was born in Bessucon, Feb. 26, 1802, and was consequently 83 years old. From his presentation at the age of 15 to the French academy of his first work, a poem upon Lee Advantages de l'Etude, he was marked out for a careerof distinction and when, five years later, he created a sensation with his first volume of Odes et Ballades his fature was assured. His life since that time has been one of prominence before the public, as a politican, as a poet, as a novelist, and as a man of thoroughly independent views. In early life, his father being a general and major domo of Joseph Bonaparte, the newly created king of Spain, he was naturally thrown, among court officials and into what is called high life, but his mind was too vigorous to be trammelled, and he very early began to show that originality of thought which distinguished him up to the very hour of his death, when through his son-in-law he declared he could face the great destroyer without the aid of a pricast! the great destroyer without the aid of a


