CANADIAN PACIFIC HOLDS CINCH

**New Steamship Service Gives Can-
adian Road Advantage Over
American Lines**

Bulletin Special.
Washington, D.C., Dec. 13.—Com-
petition between Canadian roads and
those in the United States for traffic
originating on the other side of the
Atlantic was the chief matter before
the interstate commerce commission
today. The Illinois Central had pre-
sented a petition to be allowed to
change its import rate on less than
thirty days' notice, alleging that this
was necessary to meet the competi-
tion of the Canadian lines. The gist
of the whole matter seemed to be the
ownership of two lines of steamboats
by the Canadian Pacific railroad in
virtue of which it was claimed that
they could cut ocean and lake rates
and get business at a profit while still
maintaining the published rail tariff.
Both the Canadian lines had repre-
sentatives present. John W. Loud
spoke for the Grand Trunk and A.
H. Harris for the Canadian Pacific.
The lines said they were ready to
submit themselves to the jurisdic-
tion of the interstate commission and
would not change them without thirty
days' notice.

RUSSIAN LOOTERS LUCKY.

Odessa, Dec. 13.—One of the most
daring bank robberies of recent times
in Southern Russia was committed at
the Petersburg International Bank
this afternoon, when a number of
robbers escaped with fourteen thou-
sand dollars. Cossacks were soon in
pursuit and five of the robbers were
caught, but the remainder escaped
with the swag.

TORONTO WANTS DEEP HARBOR

**Delegation From Queen City Besieges
Capital Hill With Request For
Large Expenditure**

Ottawa, Dec. 12.—A large delega-
tion arrived in the city today from Toronto
and waited upon Sir Wilfrid Laurier
and Ministers Aylesworth, Brodeur and
Flaher in the Premier's office this
forenoon and asked for the deepening
of the harbor and the establishment
of life saving appliances. The city
council, the board of trade, the Domi-
nion association, the harbor commis-
sioners, business men's association,
Canadian manufacturers' association,
shipping interests and retail associa-
tion were all represented. Mayor
Coatsworth was the first speaker. He
outlined what was wanted. Several of
the others addressed the ministers and
M. J. Haney of the business men's as-
sociation outlined a very compre-
hensive scheme of improvement. Sir Wil-
frid Laurier said that as this scheme
was a new one, all that he could say
was that he could have the matter
looked into.

SUDDEN DEATH AT RED DEER

**Young Man Found Dead In a Stable
—Cause Unknown**

Red Deer, Alta., Dec. 13.—At about
twenty minutes past eight last night
Robert Forrester was found dead in
the stable recently operated by Dr.
Thayer. About 6.30 he left his brother
at Dr. Nagle's saying that he
would go to the stable and look after
the horses and would return to their
rooms to dress for church. At 8
o'clock his brother, Edwin Forrester,
became tired waiting and went down
to the stable to look for him, finding
him stretched out on the floor behind
the stall of the stable. A doctor was
called in but everything was un-
availing. As yet it is not definitely
known whether he died of heart dis-
ease or was injured by the stallion.
There was no visible bruise. An in-
quest was probably held today. The
young man was a popular member
of the community. His brother
John Forrester is expected back from
Calgary today.

FEARS OF ANOTHER WAR

London, Dec. 5.—Simultaneously with
an announcement in some of the En-
glish newspapers that some of the
Lloyd's underwriters have been insur-
ing against an outbreak of war be-
tween Russia and Japan in 1907 at 5
guineas per cent. Col. Gaedike,
whose articles and correspondence in
the Berliner Tageblatt during the
cent war attracted universal attention,
writes for the journal a remarkable
article on the military position in the
Far East.
Col. Gaedike recognizes that the
time for a renewal of hostilities is not
yet. He says there are clear signs
that the air is loaded with electricity
but the financial condition of both Rus-
sia and Japan will postpone hostilities.
Russia's naval strength in that region
need not be considered as formidable.
She intends to have eight battle-ships
of the Dreadnaught type aloft within
eight years, while the continued in-
crease in her fighting strength ashore
is remarkable. For a time Japan in-
creased her army by only four divisions
raised during this war, she now intends
to increase it by twenty divisions, grad-
ually forming ten army corps. The
cavalry also will be increased consid-
erably. Machine guns will be attached
to every infantry regiment. The rail-
way troops and balloon detachments
will be raised, and the fortress arti-
lery increased. The authorities are
meditating a reduction of the period
of military service from three years to
two.

**South River Blocked and Insurance
Terminated, Lake Vessels Tie
Up For the Winter**

arriving from the east has been fully
fifty per cent. greater than that of

falling off.
