SCOTT WILL MAKE SECOND ATTEMPT

To Reach South Pole if He Fails in Present Venture.

Christchurch, N.Z., June 26 .-Captain Scott, as leader of the British Antarctic expedition, is making important preparation for a second attempt to reach the South Pole, should he fail to achieve his object next season. With the assistance of the members of the expedition he is topeful, of course, of accomplishing large amount of useful scientific and exploration work outside the Success depends almost wholly upon

the transport arrangements, and it

is this question, apparently, which is causing Captain Scott some misgiv-ings. His ponics, when landed from the Terra Nova at Cape Evans, were in good condition, considering what they had gone through. But Captain Scott is entirely dependent upon these ponies, and should any of them fail in the coming winter, he would be heavily handicapped, and might pos-sibly miss his goal. Ehould this occur, his plan is to make another attempt in the following season, pro-Mding that fresh transport can be brought down by December next, Captain Scott, before giving direcions for the despatch of a further supply of ponies, went thoroughly into he matter with Captain Oates, of the Inniskilling Dragoons, who is in

charge of the western party's transport animals. Captain Oates suggested that mules would be better than and that trained Indian transport mules would be ideal. 
