

Fox Farming.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Mr. Editor,-Would you enough to allow me space in your paper to request the Game Board to issue public instructions, as to the starting and running of fox farms. Fox farming is very profitable, a pair of good blacks are worth from \$7,000 to \$8,000 dollars. We would like to know what the first cost would be, but above all we are anxious to know how we are to stock the farm, as the law says, "No erson shall at any time take any oxes from burrows by smoking, digging or any other means whatever. How, then, can I start the farm? Is it with dead or injured ones, that might get a trap? or must I impor a pair; or, is there a fox far min the community to buy from? It looks as if someone has the "grip" on foxes as we have heard that you must be a rich man to start a farm. Where does the poor outport man come in If he gets a pair of black skins or lver hairs he must be satisfied with what the skin will bring, perhaps six or seven hundred dollars, whilst the ox farmer sees in sight say four or five thousand dollars.
