Bartlett sened the entertainment, and after the opening exercises, Mr. Robertson of the Presbyterian Church, was called to the chair, a position which he very ably filled, and spoke with considerable earnestness on seed sowing and harvesting in its numerous stage and spheres. Mr. Jones, of the Grenfell Institute, addressed the gatherin on the Spiritual side of Harvest, wit its many applications to life. He very forcibly dealt with Sunday School New Gower Street to Springdale St., teaching and the faithful teacher and what it was possible for them to acomplish. 
