Supreme Court.

THE KING VS. JAMES S. TAIT.

(Before Mr. Justice Emerson.)
JURY DISAGREES.

At 2.30 yesterday afternoon, the trial of Dr. James S. Tait on a charge of indecent assault was resumed. The accused gave evidence. That finished the examination of witnesses for both sides. Mr. Higgins, for the Crown, addressed the jury. He was followed by Mr. Howley, K.C., on behalf of the accused. His Lordship charged the jury after which they retired. After four hours they returned to the court room and through their foreman, announced that they could not agree on a verdict. The jury were then discharged. Mr. Higgins asked for a new trial and new jury which was ordered, the case being set down for Friday next, the 22nd inst., at 11 o'clock. Mr. Howley moved that the accused be admitted to bail. Bail was granted in the sum of \$3,000, the accused in \$1,000 and two sureties in \$1,000 each.

In Boston Marathon Being Hailed as Canada's Greatest Runner.

Four more entries were received for the B.A.A. Marathon race on April 20th, and among them was that of Victor MacAulay, of the Swastika A.A. of Windsor, N.S., whom expert judges of distance runners declared possesses all the attributes of Alfie Shrub, Hans McMor and Fred Cameron combined.

Unusual significance attaches to MacAulay's entry, for he will come to Boston heralded as the greatest Marathon runner that ever came out of Canada—and such men as Caffrey, Sherring, Hughson, Longboat, Holmer, Duffy and Cameron sported the colors of the Dominion in their palmy days.

When such a conservative judge as Tom Trenholm, of Halifax, N.S., who developed Cameron until he won the B.A.A. race four years ago, enthuses over MacAulay, a farmer boy, and declares that Cameron was never in his class, the Swastika A.A. man must be a wonder.

**The Struggle at

**Black Cap is
Disappearing.**

The action of Mr. Justice Ridley in passing sentence at the Old Bailey, London, Eng., recently without assuming the black cap is held by The Law Journal to have been quite justified. The black cap owes its origin to the Order of the Coff, and the coffin originally was a close-fitting head-covering made of white lawn or silk. The chief insignia of the order, the coffin was worn by members when sitting on the bench or pleading at the bar. It was to cover the coffin and as a token of sorrow that the black cap was used in pronouncing sentence of death. But it long ago ceased to be used merely as a token of sorrow. The Lord Chief Justice always wears his black cap in receiving the Lord Mayor at the Royal Courts of Justice, and all the judges on state occasions, such as the re-opening of Parliament, carry their black caps in their hands. The writer in The Law Journal ironically remarks that so far, at any rate, as the first-named ceremony is concerned there is no occasion for mourning or sorrow.
