Morine—The Man for Bonavista.

ALWAYS FAITHFUL TO THE DISTRICT.

The Advocate is wearing itself out in an effort to defeat Morine in Bonavista. Coaker tells us Morine has no chance in the District, that the people will not attend his meetings, and that he is down and out. If Morine is such a political corpse as Coaker would have us believe, why does he waste so much of his precious time and time over him. The Coaker organ is screeching itself hoarse the whole time, and Coaker is speeding around Bonavista District, both working overtime to kill a man that they assure us

is politically dead. The public generally are as keen on politics as Coaker, and know that the strong are always attacked and the weak unnoticed. Coaker realizes that Morine is as strong as ever in Bonavista. He realizes that Morine's Old District is not going to abandon him for a mushroom politician who has acknowledged his inability to lead a Government. Morine has done more for Bonavista than any representative they have ever had. Bonavista's people know that in coming to St. John's they always found a friend and advocate in Morine. They realized this fully when Morine, on many occasions, took up their cause and pleaded for them before the courts without charge. They realized it when some years ago the Sealers' strike was settled by Morine gaining

nearly every concession asked for by the strikers, and when he showed his constituents that they should agitate for improved conditions at the seal fishery if they hoped to obtain them. The improvements made in Bonavista District are due directly and indirectly to Morine, as when public grants were made by the Legislature, he succeeded in having his share for his district and the people had such confidence in him that they preferred to remain in opposition, with him as their representative than support candidates of the Government. A man of this type is not easily defeated. Bonavista realizing Morine's ability will support him strongly. They realize the great things he has done for the district while in opposition, and know that as an influential member of a fishermen's

Government a Government comprising such men as Cashin, Stone, Hickman and Piccott, who are practical fishermen, he can and will accomplish much more. The defeat of a man of Morine's recognized ability, and the election of Coaker would prove that the electors of that district are unworthy of the privileges conferred on them by the ballot act.

There are no valid reasons why Morine should be defeated, but there are many reasons why he should be elected; first because he is the best representative the district has ever had secondly he is now in a better position to serve his constituents than ever before. Coaker knows that the Union Party will never be returned as a controlling political party. He knows the Union represents but a small fraction of the electorate. He knows that the election of Morine would serve the interest of Bonavista, but he is not prepared to admit it. Blind to every interest but his own he is prepared if possible to drag Bonavista down in the defeat that awaits his party, but there is enough common sense in the electors of that District to avert this disaster by electing Morine and his colleagues.—X. Y. Z.

Ship's Carpenter Injured
