## New Home Rule Bill

Ireland to Have Two Parliaments Last Word With Sinn Féiners Italian Settlement May be Effectuated -- Peace Conference Impatient With Germany -- Hungarian Royalists Becoming Active.

**ARMISTICE SITUATION IMPROVED.**  
LONDON, Nov. 26. Considerable improvement in the African situation is reported here as a result of conversations in Paris between British, French, Italian and Jugo Slav representatives. The latest indications are that there is a possibility of a compromise settlement satisfactory to all parties including Capt. Gabriele D'Annunzio.

**NEW HOME RULE MEASURE.**  
LONDON, Nov. 26. A new Home Rule Bill setting up two Parliaments in Ireland with a Council or Senate of forty to be chosen by the two, will probably be introduced in Parliament within the next two weeks. Daily sessions are being held by the Cabinet Committee in charge of the measure; the subject under discussion at present being finance, which is in charge of a sub-committee under the chairmanship of

J. Austin Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer. The control of customs has always been the point of sharpest difference when other Home Rule schemes have been debated, and was one of the rocks upon which the Irish convention was shipwrecked. The control of the police was another knotty point. The most hopeful sign of an agreement is the silence which Sir Edward Carson, the Ulster leader, has preserved since the latest Irish kite was flown. It is supposed that there has been an understanding on the main points before the committee was named. The final word, however, does not rest with Parliament but with the Sinn Féin party. If that organization pursues its policy of refusing recognition of British law the British planned Irish parliament may come to nothing since the Sinn Féin polled the majority of Irish votes at the last election.

**ROYALISTS AT WORK.**  
BUDAPEST, Nov. 26. Posters demanding the restoration of the Royal Arms on public buildings and declaring the proclamation of the Hungarian Republic unlawful, appeared in this city overnight. It is generally regarded that these posters mark the opening of the Royalist Party's election campaign.

**DENIKINE RETREATING.**  
LONDON, Nov. 26. General Denikine's army in Southern Russia is retreating, the Bolsheviks having captured ten towns in three days and still advancing according to a wireless despatch received here from Moscow. Bolshevik troops are entering Ekranina where they intend to stay, the despatch adds.

**LABOR AND PROHIBITION.**  
CHICAGO, Nov. 26. The new Labor Party of the United States, refrained from taking a positive stand on the Prohibition Question but after several hours of heated discussion a compromise measure was adopted which provided for the appointment of a special committee of three to investigate the question.

**SHARP NOTE SENT TO GERMANY.**  
LONDON, Nov. 26. A wireless message from Berlin gives the text of a stern note that M. Clemenceau, President of the Peace Conference, addressed to the Chairman of the German delegation to Versailles, refusing to deviate from the terms of the peace in favor of German prisoners who are employed in the work of reconstruction in devastated northern France. Referring to the brutal treatment meted out to the populations of this district under German occupation, M. Clemenceau is quoted as saying, "The deepest sentiments of the human heart have been so cruelly injured that French public opinion cannot agree to grant the favor you request." The note sets forth that Germany systematically

delayed the performance of the armistice terms and instances the sinking of the German warships in Scapa Flow, the delay in the delivery of Germany's ships, Germany's Baltic policy and the anti-Entente propaganda in Alsace and the world at large and declares "We owe nothing to Germany except the precise fulfillment of the provisions of the peace accepted by Germany."

**FURTHER TROUBLE IN CAIRO.**  
CAIRO, Nov. 26. A British officer was murdered during a street riot here last night. Other British soldiers were fired upon by demonstrators and one soldier was wounded.

**CRISIS IN COAL SITUATION.**  
LONDON, Nov. 26. The national coal situation has reached a crisis in the view of officials here and drastic steps to curtail consumption are in contemplation.

**NOTED MEXICAN LEADER EXECUTED.**  
EL PASO, Texas, Nov. 26. General Felipe Angeles, Mexican revolutionary leader, and famed throughout the world as a military genius, was executed by a Carranza firing squad at Chihuahua city early today following conviction with two companions on charges of rebellion against the Mexican Government, according to a telegraphic report from Chihuahua city this morning.

**SIGNIFICANT OCCURRENCES IN BERLIN.**  
BERLIN, Nov. 26. The presence of General Ludendorff, former first Quartermaster General in the Imperial army of Potsdam Garrison Church, during a memorial service for the Germans who fell in battle, was the occasion for striking demonstrations. General Ludendorff spoke of military training as an invigorating and moral education. One of the congregation dressed in a field gray uniform rose and exclaimed, "When the hour comes we will follow you, General," whereupon the whole congregation stood up and sang "Deutschland uber allen." In the course of his sermon the preacher said, "When the time comes we shall die bravely for our brothers and our honor and not disgrace ourselves." At the close of the sermon the preacher standing on the tomb of Frederick the Great summoned the congregation

to unite in creating a monarchy which would be supported by the will of the people. General Ludendorff was given an ovation as he left the building, and cheers also were raised for former Emperor William.

**JUGO SLAVS WILL SIGN.**  
PARIS, Nov. 26. Plenipotentiaries of Jugo Slavs will sign the Austrian Peace Treaty at five o'clock this afternoon.

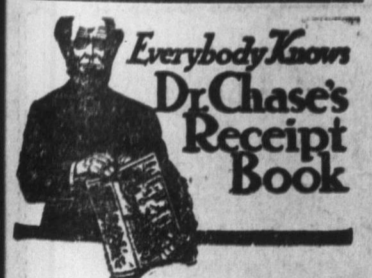
