Should Home Lessons Be Abolished?

(By a Schoolmaster, in Pearson's Weekly.)

As a teacher of a good many years' experience, I have lately given very serious consideration to the question of home lessons.

At the present time I am engaged in a secondary school of nearly two hundred boys, the great majority of whom come from a distance, some of them travelling daily as much as twenty miles each way.

Yet under the present system they leave home quite early in the morning, and after doing a full day's work (9.15 a.m. to 4 p.m.) and facing the long journey home in the evening, they are supposed to do another two hours' preparation work for the next day.

This means that practically the whole day is spent without their having any time which they can really call their own.

Doubtless the case I have quoted is a hard one, but there are many other schools where conditions are very much the same. And whatever the conditions, I think it is very much open to question whether home lessons are desirable.

How many men, whatever their occupation, would care, after a full day at the office or workshop, to sit down in the evening and spend two hours in preparing for the next day's work?

Why Children Get Bad Tempered.
Five or six hours a day, properly distributed over the morning and afternoon, is quite as much as the ordinary boy or girl can profitably devote to his or her lessons, and the evenings should be entirely free and devoted to healthy recreation for mind and body.

Nowadays one often reads complaints that we are becoming a bad-tempered nation, and that the sense of humor is dying out amongst us, without doubt these charges are true, but what is the reason for them? I believe it is to be found in the fact that we put too great a strain upon our boys and girls, and expect too much from them. They grow old before their time.

But it may be argued that school hours have not grown longer in recent times. Possibly not, but the amount and standard of the work done in those hours has increased tremendously, and puts a much greater strain upon the pupils. Apart from all that, the severity of the modern examination system involves laborious days for our youngsters.

I believe that home lessons could be abolished without any detriment to the work of our schools. With their evenings free, the boys and girls would come much fresher to their work each morning, and much more would be accomplished during the day than hitherto.

Finally, just as the pupils should have their evenings entirely free, so should the teachers, for a day's teaching puts a tremendous strain upon the nerves.

Many teachers spend their evenings in correcting exercises and preparing lessons for the next day, with the result that they come to school tired and dispirited.

Historic Relics.

Gold ornaments, idols, crowns, armor and other relics of great historic value, which date from the civilizations of the Incas, Aztecs and other Mexican and Central and South American peoples are contained in a collection of 300 specimens recently placed on view for the first time in the museum of the University of Pennsylvania at Philadelphia. The exhibit was only recently brought to its present completeness by the purchase of objects which had been in possession of a noble French family for generations, but which were sold at Paris because the family was impoverished. Gold was used by the Aztecs and Incas only for ornaments,
