The explosion hurled great concrete blocks for hundreds of feet on the Banks of Newfoundland. and derailed a freight train which was standing on the track beside the elevator. Heavy damage was caused in nearby towns by the explosion: Windows were shattered in Hammond, Whitting and East Chicago. The heaviest sufferer was Whitting, where it was reported every window in the down town business district was broken. Early estimates put the property loss at six millions.
