

King's Search for a Queen.

A RICH, CULTURED GIRL FOR
BRIDE.

King Boris, the bachelor monarch of Bulgaria, is in search of a beautiful bride.

She must be American, young, rich, and cultured, and must interest herself in the education of women and the establishment of schools for young women in Bulgaria.

The announcement of the King's quest is made by M. Stamboulsky, Bulgarian Prime Minister, according to a message from Geneva. It is understood that the Bulgarians have lost faith in Royal alliances, and think that an American Queen might be a valuable asset to their country.

King Boris is thirty, and, according to report, has been engaged three times in the past few years. Report, however, was a little premature.

The first "engagement" was reported in March, 1915, when King Boris was heir apparent and the German Princess Victoria of Schleswig-Holstein was named as the bride-to-be.

Nothing more was heard until January, 1921, when an "engagement" to Princess Marie, daughter of the King of Roumania, was reported. In the following June, however, the Princess married King Alexander of Yugoslavia.

Then, in August, 1921, Sofia announced that the Bulgarians were anxious to see King Boris marry, and hoped that his bride might be an English princess.

ANOTHER RUMOR.

Again silence until January of this year, and then came another report of the betrothal of the King, this time to Princess Jolanda of Italy. But apparently it was merely a report, and now the announcement of a search for an American bride brings the royal romance up to date.

When King Ferdinand left his country for his country's good in 1918, Boris succeeded to the throne, and at once commenced a new regime which endeared him to his subjects. His life is as simple and his abode as humble as his father's had been extravagant.

EX-KAISER'S MARRIAGE.

The wedding of the ex-Kaiser with Princess Hermine of Reuss is provisionally fixed for November, according to an official announcement made by "the general plenipotentiary of the Royal house, Privy Councillor von Berg."

At present the bride-to-be is staying with her aunt, the Grand Duchess Louise of Baden.

Princess Hermine is thirty-five, and a widow. Despite denials, there is little doubt that the ex-Kaiser's decision to remarry was strongly resisted by his sons and other members of the Hohenzollern family.

The Princess visited Doorn for a week in February. An exchange of letters followed, culminating in an engagement.

Monarchist papers in Germany are somewhat lukewarm in their approval of the engagement. One paper says: "It is the ex-Kaiser's decision is comprehensible to those who realize the depressing spiritual loneliness in which he has lived at Doorn since the death of his wife."

An Exchange message states that the ex-Kaiser wished to keep his betrothal secret until after October 22, the birthday of the late ex-Empress. Unofficially, Berlin reports, however, gave the news to the world, and then the ex-Kaiser decided not to delay the announcement longer.

TO BE ENBAZONED ON REGIMENTAL COLOURS.

The King has approved of the award to the regiments and corps of the battle honors won by them in the Great War, and regiments and corps will have awarded them and recorded in the Army List honors due them for taking part in the battles enumerated in the report of the Battles Nomenclature Committee. On the colors will be embroidered not more than 24 honors, of which not more than ten will be Great War honors, to embrace the whole history of the regiment concerned from the date on which it was raised to the end of the war.

When the Mayor of Portsmouth visited the Quest in Portsmouth Harbour, Captain Wild presented him with an ornamental building, a gift from General Smuts's daughter.

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Sleep by Compass.

North, south, east or west? In which direction should one's head point when lying asleep? Some religious enjoin the east; some scientists have urged the north, corresponding with the pointing of the magnetic compass; while there are those, probably the great majority, who regard it as a matter of indifference.

The eminent French physician, Dr. Cabanes, after much study and consideration, discusses the question elaborately in the "Chronique Médicale." He reminds us that, according to an old tradition which obtained among the ancient Israelites, the direction north-south is preferable. From north to south runs also the direction of the great magnetic currents of the earth. But this the people of Israel could not have known.

In 1845 Prof. Reichenbach published an essay in which he called special attention to the diseases of those who slept headed toward the east. The best position in sleeping was from north to south, with the head toward the north. Further observations have, however, not resulted in any proof for the supposition that the north-south direction was particularly wholesome in sleeping. The only thing that seems established is that some people sleep better in one direction than in the other.—New York Tribune.

Ghastly Gas-Lakes.

In some parts of the globe there exist curious invisible gas-traps, many being fatal to any living thing which approaches them.

For instance, there is the famous Grotto del Cane, or "Dog Grotto," in Italy. This is a cavern which contains carbonic acid gas, which exudes from the ground. It rises slowly and invisibly, and flows out like an imaginary stream. Dogs have been put into this infernal enclosure to prove to visitors and strangers that the gas is fatal. Hence it gets its name.

As the dogs breathe near the earth and within the noxious atmosphere, they soon expire if not immediately removed. Human beings have been known to walk about the "Grotto del Cane," but if they were to lie down flat on the ground they would never rise again!

This serves to recall a great gas lake in Java, which causes a valley nearby to become a veritable death-trap. It is called the "Valley of Death," for those who venture in this ghastly gas valley are instantly killed.

No living thing can exist in its atmosphere, and if the unwary explorer does enter, he dies, and his bones remain unburied by the side of the beasts which have met a similar unfortunate fate.

Again, carbonic acid gas is said to abound over the Lake Avernus, in Campania, with the terrible result that the birds which happen to fly over it immediately fall to the water-gassed!
