Urges all War be Made Crime.

Following an address by Mrs. Francis E. Sayre on "The Imperative Necessity of Ending War," the Boston Mt. Holyoke College Alumnae Association passed a resolution at its meeting in the Hotel Vendome, urging that war between nations be declared a public crime and endorsing President Harding's wish that "we shall lead the world to outlaw war."

SAYS ISOLATION IMPOSSIBLE.

Isolation, she said, is commercially impossible, and spiritually is moral suicide. It is seen by the ruin of Germany, a nation which for half a century pursued a policy of isolation. In arriving at this conclusion, she said: "Nations which insist on going to war for the purpose of settling disputes are still cave men mentally. War is said to be a means of self-defence. The next war, if there is to be one, will be a thousandfold more destructive than the last war."

"Science is advancing so fast that it will be able to provide the most fiendish inventions, whereby literally at the push of a button a whole city may be destroyed. A few more wars, each one more horrible than the other must eventually utterly annihilate our civilization and wipe all trace of us from the face of the earth. There is to be found in the wilderness of South America the traces of a great civilization, of a highly developed race called the Mayas. Through a series of wars they were gradually wiped out, until today only a few scattered ruins remain to teach us the historical lesson that whole races may actually be exterminated through wars among themselves."

"Now suppose we grant the supposition that all wars must cease, what shall we do to stop it? Each individual nation is an important link to be forged into the great chain of public condemnation which will hold in leash the great monster—war. Each one of us must realize his responsibility in this matter, and must take it on himself to develop a decided opinion against war—and express aloud his hopeful belief that a lasting world peace may be established. We must educate for peace."

DEMPSEY AT NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—Jack Dempsey is expected to arrive in the city to-day and Jack Kearns, his manager, tomorrow or Thursday. When the latter arrives, arrangements probably will be made for at least two bouts with Jess Willard, from whom he won the title, and a second, providing he survives the first, with one of the aspirants who never has held the crown.

GREB DEFENDS TITLE.

JERSEY CITY, N.J., January 22.—Harry Greb, of Pittsburgh, successfully defended his American light-heavyweight boxing championship to-night against Billy Shade, of California, in a scheduled twelve-round bout which went the limit.

Greb won the majority of the rounds, but was booted continually by the crowd after the fifth round because of the lightness of his attack. The bout was fast, but neither man produced a stinging punch, and both left the ring unblemished.

The champion used his peculiar "windmill" style, missing often, but even so, he invariably landed several blows to the Californian's one. Shade was aggressive in spots, but the hitting power of both contenders drew derision from the spectators.

JEFF SMITH TRAILING GREB.

Jeff Smith, the Bayonne middleweight, who, says the New York Telegraph, seems to be getting better day by day in every way, and who compiled the phenomenal ring record of scoring twenty-six consecutive victories during 1922, many by the knockout route, is on the trail of Harry Greb, the American light-heavyweight champion.

Al Lippe, manager of the Bayonne demon, complains that despite the fact that local, Boston, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, New Orleans, and Dayton clubs are clamoring for a Smith-Greb match, accepted none of the offers. Smith's manager avers the Jerseyman was to have boxed Greb at the Jersey City Arena, Monday, but instead the Smoky City man took on Billy Shade, the Californian.

Smith is ready to battle Greb to a decision and accept any percentage the American light-heavyweight champion cares to give him. The same terms go for Johnny Wilson, the middleweight title holder, Smith, who is a legitimate middleweight and can make 160 pounds, does not bar any of the big fellows, for in 1922 he engaged in twenty-six skirmishes, only six of his

Helicopter in Air.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—An announcement that the army air service has developed a helicopter and made successful flights with the machine at McCook Field, Dayton, O., was made to-night by the war department.

The duration of the experimental flight was 1 minute and 42 seconds, during which the machine rose straight from the ground and was manoeuvred at will of the operator at an altitude of six ft. It descended and landed easily.

Weights 3000 Pounds.

"In flight," the war department said, "it was steady and the landing was easily accomplished. The helicopter demonstrated a high degree of inherent stability. This flight was witnessed by many army officials and employees at McCook field, and while the duration of the flight was less than two minutes, it will be remembered that the first airplane flight in a heavier-than-air machine lasted only 59 seconds."

The helicopter was constructed by the army air service and designed by Dr. G. DeBothezat, under whose personal supervision it was constructed. Work was started secretly in July, 1921, and no announcement of the tests were made until demonstrations proved the successful performance of the craft.

The new machine has a total weight of 3600 pounds and has four lifting screws actuated by a 170-horsepower motor. The system of gearing is said to be entirely novel, being specially designed by Dr. DeBothezat.

"The remarkable results obtained," the statement said, "demonstrate in a notable way the importance of making adequate use of scientific methods. The construction of the helicopter consumed only 18 months, including the work of designing, building, adjusting and testing."

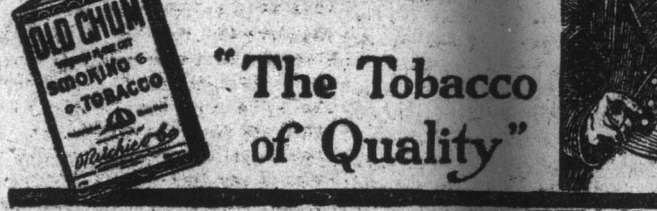
Self-Cleaning Filter Makes Water Clean.

In a new cistern filter, shown in the January Popular Mechanics Magazine, water entering at the top from a down-sprout flows over a slanting screen, which allows leaves and coarse material to be washed out through an outlet near the top. The water with fine dirt passes down into a chamber at the bottom, and as the rain in-
