MODEL WILL BE PLACED ON EXHIBITION.


A meeting of the finalization committee of the National War Memorial was held at noon yesterday in the Board of Trade rooms, when the design for the War Memorial to be erected at King's Beach, was decided upon. The proposed structure was fully discussed and finalized. The model is being placed on exhibition in the store of James Baird Ltd., when the public in general will have an opportunity of seeing it. There will also be placed on exhibition a water color of the Monument now erected at Grandcourt, a copy of which will be given free as a supplement in the next "Veteran" Magazine. It is hoped that a plan of the Newfoundland Memorial Park at Beaumont Hamel will be ready next week. Work on the King's Beach has been delayed owing to unforeseen circumstances, and the unveiling of the Monument will not take place until July 1st, 1924. Padre Nangle states that the local contractors will be on the same footing as Canadian and English firms.
