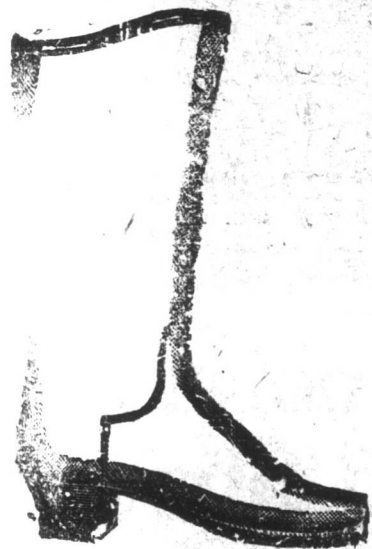

New Liquor Treaty With Great Britain Formally Proclaimed by U.S.A.

Labour Wins Another Seat—Opening of Parliament in Rome Anxiously Awaited—Malaria Spreading in Russia—New Speed Record.

U.S. TO TRY AND STOP ILLICIT LIQUOR TRAFFIC

WASHINGTON, May 23. The formal proclamation putting into effect the new liquor treaty with Great Britain has been issued by President Coolidge, after an exchange of ratifications with Secretary Hughes and Ambassador Howard, representing their respective governments. The proclamation is in the form of a public announcement of the Treaty which it sets out in full. The Treaty will remain in force for a year from this date and if no notice is served during the year and if there is no desire to modify the pact, it will continue in force another year until so on. The primary purpose is to curb the illicit liquor traffic on all or any of the United States and to remove the annoyance to British vessels due to the application of the United States prohibition enforcement statutes to sealed stores of liquors aboard those vessels in the United States waters.

MOTION DEPOSED.

LONDON, May 23. The much heralded attack in the House of Commons on the Labor Government's policy on employment ended to-night in an anti-climax. The Conservatives' motion, to reduce the salary of the Labor Minister, Tom Shaw, by £100 was voted out after motion by former Premier Baldwin to impose closure and was defeated by 244 to 210.

BIG FUSS IN PRESIDENTIAL CIRCLES.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., May 23. Dr. Clarence E. M. Hartney, 44 year old bachelor who is Pastor of Arch Street Church, Philadelphia, an ultra fundamentalist and the leader in the movement to remove D. D. Harry Emerson Fosdick from the pulpit of the First Presbyterian Church, New York, for alleged heresy, was elected Moderator at this afternoon's session of the 136th general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America. The issue of fundamentalism was sharply drawn by Wm. Jennings Bryan, a vigorous leader among fundamentalists, placing Dr. McCarty's name in nomination.

LIVERPOOL, May 23. Labour has gained another seat in Parliament by the election of Joseph Gibbons in the West Toxteth by-election. Gibbons received 15,505

MAURETANIA ESTABLISHES NEW SPEED RECORD.

SOUTHAMPTON, May 23. The Cunard liner Mauretania, returning here from Cherbourg, where her turbines were rebladed, was tested for speed over a 23 mile course off the Isle of Wight, and declared to have beaten her original record established in 1911. She ran 14 miles with tide and 14 against, averaging 26.4 knots, but officials say that during the run with the tide she touched 31 knots which, they claim, is the fastest speed attained by a mercantile ship in the world.

MALARIA SPREADING IN RUSSIA.

LENINGRAD, Russia, May 23. Malaria and other diseases are spreading alarmingly throughout Russia as there is an acute shortage of quinine and other essential drugs, according to a report presented to the Epidemiological Congress here yesterday. There were more than six million cases of malaria in Russia last year, also 300,000 cases of typhus, 250,000 cases of recurrent typhus, and 50,000 cases of scurvy. The large stocks of quinine and other drugs left by American Relief Associations upon its withdrawal, have been exhausted.

POSSIBILITY OF TRANSMITTING RADIO MESSAGES IN "BEAM."

LONDON, May 23. The possibility of transmitting radio messages in "beam" between Great Britain and Australia, is likely soon to be demonstrated, according to newspapers which make a feature to-day of the announcement in the Australian House of Representatives by Premier Bruce, yesterday.

OPENING OF PARLIAMENT IN ROME KEENLY AWAITED.

ROME, May 22. Rome is awaiting with keen expectation the opening of Parliament on Saturday and the King's Speech from the Throne. The Deputies already are arriving in the capital and there is keen competition among the people generally for invitations to the opening. It is generally believed that King Victor will seek reference to the important reorganization for national defence on land, at sea, and also in the air service in which the national militia will become an integral part of the armed forces of the state.
