TO-DAY'S MESSAGES

ANTI-BRITISH DEMONSTRATIONS IN IRELAND.

DUBLIN, Nov. 10. Two attacks upon moving picture houses over the week-end brought evidence of an undying anti-British sentiment among certain classes. At Dublin a picture showing the Battle of Ypres was stolen while in process of being exhibited, and under the revolvers of the attacking party the theatre officials were forced to return the admission money to spectators. At Kingstown where a picture showing the world tour of the Prince of Wales was being exhibited, the same procedure was carried out. Other minor disturbances were carried out and more are promised for Armistice Day. One arrest was made.

QUEBEC PAPER PLANT TO BE STARTED.

HULL, Que., Nov. 10. The work of erecting the International Paper Company's plant at East Templeton will commence toward the end of the month. Engineers have just completed the survey.

SPANISH DIRECTOR DECLARES RIFF WAR ENDED.

TETUAN, Nov. 10. Captain General Primo De Rivera, President of the Spanish Directorate, left Morocco today, announcing that the campaign against the Rifan Tribesmen had been brought to a glorious conclusion and that peace would be permanent.

ATTEMPT ON KING FERDINAND'S LIFE FOILED.

VIENNA, Nov. 10. A Communist attempt to assassinate King Ferdinand of Rumania has been thwarted. Lying in wait at a country inn for the return of the King from a hunt, a band of Communists were captured by troops after a battle in which revolvers and hand grenades were used by the Communists.

Schooner Manned by Eskimo Crew Now at Liverpool

MONTREAL, Nov. 3.—Unique in the annals of Arctic navigation is the bringing down the Chesterfield Inlet bordering on the 64th degree to Liverpool, N.S., a distance of nearly 3,000 miles, of a Northern trading schooner named by Paul Hooded Eskimos. The schooner Jean Revillon, is a fur trading craft belonging to Revillon Frazar of Montreal. It was built in 1923, and since then has plied the Arctic waters north and west of Chesterfield Inlet.

To overhaul the vessel, it was necessary to bring it to civilization to Shelburne, N.S. In charge of Capt. W. H. Robertson, a Newfoundland, and Mrs. C. J. King, of Montreal, an engineer, the vessel left on August first, with a crew of four Eskimos. Taking the Hudson Straits route, the schooner plodded its way through fierce gales. The whole of the journey was a perilous undertaking. Three weeks into, the Jean Revillon arrived at Liverpool, N.S., on Sunday night. The Captain, engineer and crew thanked that the voyage was nearly at an end. The crew are stated to have been prudent and the experiment has proved successful. It has never before been thought advisable to take Eskimos out of their own sphere, but this has proved that the feat can be done.

For about a year the native crew has worked on the vessel and they have had a good training. Although excellent seamen in their own waters, it was thought that the voyage so far south would be too much for them. The climate south does not agree with them and their journey north is being arranged as expeditiously as possible.

\$27,000,000 to Improve Kansas

KANSAS CITY, Mo.—To speed civic improvements Kansas City proposes to spend \$27,000,000 within the next few years. Voters will have an opportunity November 3 to act upon 25 bond proposals adopted by the city council. To cope with growing traffic congestion an expenditure of \$7,500,000 is proposed for opening and widening traffic ways. This is the largest single item, but other proposals bring the traffic bill up to more than \$11,000,000.

Parks and beautification would cost another \$7,000,000, with more than \$4,000,000 to be spent in acquiring and beautifying the section around the union station and the Liberty memorial, which has been envisioned as a civic center. Sign boards perched on hills overlooking the \$2,000,000 memorial and union station plaza will go if the bond issue is authorized by the voters for the purchase of adjacent property. Another proposal calls for \$500,000 for a municipal auditorium.

For a municipal air field, bonds of half a million dollars would be issued and \$5,000,000 would be added for better tourist camps.
