He criticised in a friendly spirit, some other details of the Bill, initimating bis intention to sug-est some amendments in Committee. Mr. Cameron (South Ontario) defended the ballot, and showed the absurdity of the objection that it was an-English. Mr. Dymond, alluding to Mr. Cameron's hostitility to the ballot, referred to some meidents in the hou, gentleman's elec-tion in Cardwell as a proof of the neces-sity for the ballot. Mr. Young congratulated the Govern-ment on the excellent measure they had brought down, and defended the ballot as perhaps its best feature. Mr. Mills moved the adjournment of the Bill.
