WOULD BUILD ROAD FOR \$13,000 A MILE

(Continued from page 1.)

Minty, Emerson, Sutherland and Hayes were present at the meeting. Witness said he had never seen the minutes of the meeting.

Shares for Advice

Mr. Woodman said that he was to get five shares as part of his pay for his engineering advice. He understood that Mr. J. K. Cornwall was the incorporator of the proposed railway. Witness said he prepared a statement of the probable cost of the road, but he had never been over the country through which the road was to run.

Mr. Woodman produced his original report on the railway, also all communications he had concerning the Athabasca railway, and informed the commissioners that he had no objection to them seeing them. Mr. Johnston read Mr. Woodman's report, which showed that he had estimated the cost of the first hundred miles from Edmonton to Ft. McMurray at \$51,000. This, he pointed out, was exclusive of legal expenses of organization, and the cost of special bridges, tunnelling, etc., at Edmonton. Witness, in his report, commented on the fact that it was hard to make an accurate estimate of the cost of the road as he had not been over it.

Mr. Woodman said he got some information as to the nature of the country from Hudson's Bay men, and some from J. K. Cornwall, whom he met once in Winnipeg in the year 1907. Mr. Woodman said he was present at a meeting at which it was decided that Mr. Hayes and Mr. Davidson should be sent to England to see and float the enterprise. Minutes were kept of the meeting, which were taken either by Mr. Minty or Mr. Emerson. Witness said that his estimate of the cost was discussed at a meeting of the syndicate, and he added \$1,000 a mile for terminals. Mr. Cornwall was in the city about the time of the presentation of the second estimate and attended one of the meetings, but he could not say what the date was.

Mr. Cornwall Expected Aid

Mr. Cornwall expected that a guarantee of bonds would be secured from the provincial government. It was expected that the government would guarantee bonds to the extent of \$13,000 a mile, but that the syndicate would get more if possible.

Mr. Justice Beck-You would not refuse a larger grant if you could get it?

Mr. Woodman—No.

Draft Agreement With Government

Witness continued, said that he had not seen a draft agreement purporting to be an agreement between the Athabasca syndicate and the Alberta government providing for the guarantee of the bonds of the road to the amount of \$13,000 a mile, interest to be charged at 4 per cent.

Mr. Johnston handed the document to Mr. Woodman, who, after reading it, said he had never seen it before.

Witness said he attended the meetings of the syndicate after 1907, where reports were received and discussed in connection with the financing of the road. Mr. Cornwall attended only one meeting of the syndicate. Mr. Bowen came to Winnipeg in May or June, 1907, and attended a meeting of the syndicate, witness being introduced to him by Mr. Minty. Mr. Bowen wished to secure the rights under the charter of the Athabasca syndicate. Mr. Bowen had come down from Mr. Cornwall. Mr. Bowen said he represented the capitalists, who were building street railways on the coast. Soon afterwards witness was introduced to him by Mr. Bowen. Mr. Bowen was representing W. R. Clarke of Kansas City. Mr. Bowen was negotiating at Edmonton with the government through Mr. Cornwall, who introduced him to the government members. Witness said that he met Mr. W. R. Clarke in Winnipeg in 1908. This would be in the month of July. He understood Mr. Clarke was the capitalist backing Mr. Bowen.

Mr. Woodman said that he sent Mr. Cecil Goddard out to make a reconnaissance of the line. His instructions to do so came from Mr. Clarke. He understood Mr. Goddard's report was for Mr. Clarke's personal information. Mr. Goddard consulted Dr. Waddell in reference to this his report after he returned from the survey. He came to Winnipeg and went on to Minneapolis to see Dr. Waddell and Mr. W. R. Clarke. He was asked to continue his report on the survey. He had heard that they were successful in getting the bonds guaranteed by the Alberta government. The question of the guarantee of the bonds was never discussed at any meeting.

TURNED OVER ALL REPORTS

Witness said that when he settled up his account with Mr. Clarke he turned some papers over to Mr. Minty, Messrs. Munson, Allan, Laird and Davis had secured a settlement of his account. He claimed \$1,800 but Mr. Clarke only offered \$300. A settlement was made in March of this year for \$1,500, which was a part of the country through which the road was to run.

The entire history of this People's shield contest does not reflect any credit upon the man Parker, who is running it on behalf of the newspaper which donated it. The final decision is difficult to believe. The decision is unportant, and as the donors are British, it will give the public a very poor opinion of British fair play. However, it must be remembered that the case is of the unfairness and incompleteness of one single man, and not of the great British sporting nation. As a matter of fact, the outcome is both unfair and up-British.

Let us go into the history of it. The Caledonia football team is composed of young Calgarians, all working men. The majority of the players are stone cutters, though there are also printers, plumbers and carpenters. They are the best on earth, but they are working men and are not rich. They organized the team and have run it ever since and all by themselves.

Before the shield contest was put up for competition the Caledonians took several journeys throughout the province, keeping the game alive, and defeating their opponents. The players' journeys were frequently quite expensive.

The first shield game was played in Toronto. The second game was played in Winnipeg, and the Caledonians went after it and got it. The men lost their time and paid their expenses. They met the other teams and won out. The year was 1907, and the Caledonians were expected to defend the title. The club went to Vancouver without the slightest objection. They played the Thistles to a tie. They made no proposition for a joint division of the shield, but they played again and again played to a tie. They said nothing about leaving on the next train, but waited over and played a third game with the same team, winning by a large score, and defeating the other team. The boys were in Vancouver for more than two weeks defending the shield.

This displeased Mr. Parker, who found that the Caledonians did not listen to some of his suggestions. He came to Calgary and told the writer that he was trying to get some of the Caledonians professionalized. That evidently did not succeed.

Last year the shield games were played in Calgary. The Celtics of Vancouver beat off their first opponent and played the finals on a Saturday evening. The Celtics played their opponents, and scored the only goal. However, a Caledonia player was on the ground when this happened, and the umpire blew his whistle and disallowed the goal. The Celtics made no kick about the decision.

The Caledonians asked for a replay, but the Celtics declined to do so. There was nothing to it, then, but that the Caledonians hold the shield. And they thought so and every person thought so, until it was announced this week that there had been an arrangement between the clubs for joint ownership. There had been no such arrangement and the idea is a silly one.

The man Parker listened to a statement from the Vancouver team, but though he passed through this city made no effort to get at statement from the Caledonians. And now it seems that he has ordered a replay in Vancouver on May 24.

This is the limit. Had he ordered a replay in Calgary, there would not have been so much objection. Had he ordered a replay at a neutral point the action would have been high handed, but might be defended. But to order a replay upon the enemy's grounds is rather remarkable. When the Caledonians played the games in Vancouver, the Celtics played them in Vancouver. When Vancouver played the games in Calgary, the man Parker ordered them to be played off in Vancouver.

The date is fixed at the close of the Celtics' season and before the Caledonians' season has begun. The whole thing is unfair, and it is to be hoped that under the circumstances that the Caledonians will hold to the cup until they learn the reason why they should give it up. If this is the way that the people's shield is handled, it might be better to do away with the shield games entirely, and place the championship in the hands of fair and honorable people.

TWO SOUTH AMERICAN NATIONS WHICH ARE NOT AT WAR NOW

Brazil and Uruguay Have Come to Terms.

Rio Janeiro, April 27.—The Brazilian senate has approved by a unanimous vote the treaty signed by Brazil and Uruguay in October last, by which Brazil cedes to Uruguay a part of the waters and the island of Lake Mirim and of the Jaguar river.

The chamber of deputies had already approved this treaty. Uruguay is accorded free navigation for merchant and war vessels between the lake and the ocean by the Brazilian waters of Sangonalo and the Rio Grande. These concessions have been made voluntarily by Brazil without any compensation whatever.

Presentation to Mr. Fielding

Ottawa, April 26.—Hon. W. S. Fielding was tonight presented with the receipt for an investment of \$100,000 made in his behalf by personal friends of the house of commons and some influential individuals formed for the purpose of receiving subscriptions for a testimonial to the minister in recognition of his long service as member of parliament and minister of finance. The response to the call of the committee was most satisfactory and was not limited by party affiliations. Many contributions were received without solicitation.
