Hughes advertised for volunteers for the war, and when rebuked by General Hutton he replied that as a member of Parlament he was free to call on his own countrymen as he had done. This annoved General Hutton. and was the beginning of the trouble The Globe says : - "If this is the case, we can only say that the offence, if offence it may be called, was trivial in the extreme, and certainly did not deserve the punishment of military ostracism. 
