ABYSSINIA'S ANSWER

Geneva, Sept.—Serfdom, which is described as a sort of apprenticeship exists in Ethiopia (Abyssinia) but slavery is forbidden, the delegation from that African empire has informed the League of Nations. Ethiopia's application for admission to the league is said to be in danger of rejection because of allegations that slavery on a large scale prevails within her domain.

The delegation declared to the league that the slave trade was forbidden and made punishable by death. The serfs could not be bought or sold and could appeal to the courts if ill treated.

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
