POISON IN THE PORRIDGE. Singular Fatality at St. Catharine, Quebec.

QUEBEC, March 24.—A strange case of poisoning occurred on Friday at St. Catharine, some 30 miles north of this city. A farmer named Joseph Robitaille having purchased oatmeal from a grocer named Julian, of Port Rouge, partook of it, and finding it bad to the taste, gave it to his dog, which at once gave signs of poisoning. Robitaille vomited copiously, and in spite of doctors' efforts died yesterday. Three more persons are reported ill at Portneuf, having eaten the oatmeal. The merchant cannot account for the poison in the oatmeal. It is thought, however, that as a rule country merchants are obliged to keep all sorts of goods in stock, Julian must have inadvertently thrown in the tin box in which he kept the oatmeal some poison intended for another box. Dr. Fiset, Government analyist, has gone to St. Catherine to hold a post-mortem examination.

PROGRESS OF FORESTRY. Court Forest City, No. 5744, of the Ancient Order of Foresters, completed its 22nd year on Dec. 31 last, but the annual statement has just been published. The report contains much information of interest to the Foresters of London, and especially to the members of the court. Forest City has in 1894, like in all its years of existence, been doing a good work, particularly in re-lieving the sick. During the year no less than \$1,783 72 has been dispensed among the members. This was an unusually large amount, and decreased the assets by \$118 69. On Dec. 31, 1893, the court was 302 strong. In the following twelve months 27 members were initiated and 11 juvenile transfers were accepted, making a total of 38 new Foresters. Nineteen were suspended for non-payment of dues, leaving the ncrease 19, and the total financial membership on Dec. 31 last 321; honorary, 9; total 337. The average age of the 38 members accepted during the year was 21, and the average age of the total membership is 34 years. Seven members joined the benedicts brothers are on the widows' fund; 74 members received sick benefits in the year; and the average received by the total membership was \$5 56; 3,345 days sickness were experienced, or an average per member of 10; highest number of days sickness for any individual member, 365; lowest 2.
