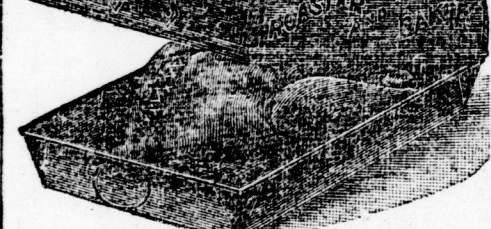

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—A meeting of the London West Council
will be held to-night. The books of the ex-
treasurer are still in the hands of the
sheriff.—Another petition is in the hands of the
city clerk asking that the disputed terri-
tory on Bathurst street be watered. It is
signed by owners of two-thirds of the
frontage.—When the London West school was
dismissed yesterday afternoon about a
dozen of the pupils found that their hats
had been stolen or else hidden by some mis-
chievous boys.—Auditor Duff's house in London West
was the scene of a meeting on Wednesday
night. Revs. Macdonald, Councillors
Moore and Hammond, Clerk Bartram and
Mr. E. R. Cameron were present but no
business was transacted.—Rev. J. H. Hector lectured in the King
Street Methodist Church last night on "A
Bible Wife and How to Get Her." Mr.
Hector did not have as large an audience
as he has had, but he is as funny and practical
as ever. Four choruses were rendered in
an excellent manner by the children of the
Sunday school under the leadership of Mr.
John Goodge. Miss Benson acted as ac-
companied, and Mr. Rigby, the pastor,
occupied the chair.—Bishop Baldwin paid a visit to Port
Dover recently and confirmed eighteen
candidates there and thirteen at Victoria.
At the former place the following clergy
assisted: The Rev. Canon Young and Rev.
Rural Dean Hicks, both of Simcoe; the
Rev. A. Gaden, of Nanticoke, Niagara;
and the Rev. J. B. Newell, incumbent of
the parish. Capt. Thos. Bayley was to
have been confirmed, but he died suddenly
the same evening. The bishop made a
touching allusion to the circumstance in
the course of his address.—A tempest in a teapot" was the ex-
pression an alderman applied to the de-
velopments of last night's meeting of the
so-called investigation committee, ap-
pointed by the council to ascertain how
Mr. Scandrett's name happened to be
added to a street watering petition for
Bathurst street, after the said petition had
been handled by No. 3 committee. The
evidence went to show that the petition
had been secured at the city engineer's office
by Mr. S. H. Craig, for Mr. Scandrett's
signature. Aid. Parill, chairman of the
committee, knew nothing about it, and the
committee exonerated him from any con-
nection with the matter, and passed a res-
olution condemning the practice of allowing
any document referred from the council or
a committee to be thus altered. The
committee was doubtful whether the
Engineer had allowed Mr. Craig to take
away the petition or not and declared it
null and void.

Public School Items.

No. 2 committee of the Board of Educa-
tion met last night, with Messrs. D. W.
Blackwell (chairman), Stevenson, Ander-
son, Martin, Logan, Greenlees, Turner and
Secretary McEllen present. D. Mc-
Donald's offer to do all repairing as well
as taking care of the Princess avenue
school for \$600 a year was referred to the
board. Mr. J. C. C. Evans will build two
cloak rooms at the Aberdeen school for \$85.
The contract for sodding and grading Lowe
avenue school yard was awarded to W.
Legg at 84 cents a square yard. There was
a lot of discussion on the janitors' salary
question, and Mr. Logan moved that the
basis of salary be placed at \$45 a room for
four rooms and over, and \$50 a room for the
smaller schools. Carried.

Lost and Found.

The missing old man David Chambers has
been found. Aid. John Heaman and Mr.
John C. Orchard, of York street west, were
among the searching party. The first trace
they heard of Mr. Chambers was from
Mr. Phillips, a grain buyer on the
market, who had seen him going westerly
across the market about 12 o'clock
yesterday. They went to the Ridout street
crossing of the Grand Trunk, and learned
from the watchman that Mr. Chambers had
gone south on the Grand Trunk. Top up-
wards of three hours a diligent search was kept
up in No. 6 ward, with the result that the
missing man was found about 3:30 aimlessly
wandering along Ridout street near the
limits. He was at a loss to account for his
whereabouts.

Business Men, Think It Over.

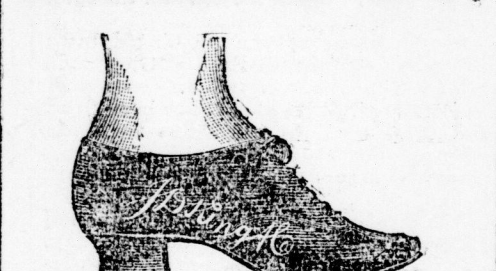
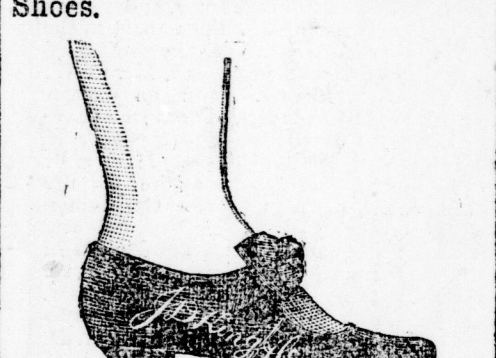
When kitchen girls are plenty it is not

Entering business without advertising is
like printing without ink. The form may
be gone through with, but the public will
not be the wiser.If you wish to try the experiment of
diminishing your advertising expenditure
for the sake of noting its effect on trade,
just double it instead and see if the effect
on trade will not be agreeably prominent.
Generally it costs more to cut down the ad-
vertising than to increase it.

No. 2 Committee.

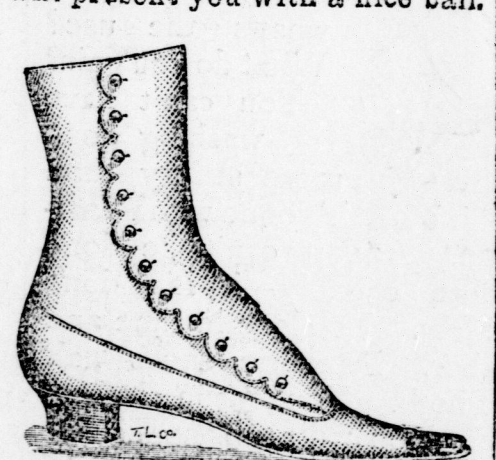
At last evening's meeting of the Board of
Works the following members were pres-

quarter of petitioners appeared in favor
of opening up Dufferin avenue from Quebec
to Charlotte streets. On motion it was left
in the hands of the engineer to report on.

permission to use Richmond street sewer.
M. J. Kent complained of the outlet of
Wharfedale road sewer. Joseph Howlett,
Delaware, claim of \$2 for injury done to
his wagon on York street. Engineer Gray-
don sent in a letter recommending that the
iron gates at the west end of the arcade be
given to the Western Fair Board for
entrance gates. The communi-
cation was laid over to see whether
the Fair Board wants them or not.
The cyclists sent in a petition for per-
mission to ride on the sidewalks on one side of
the road between the hours of 4:30 to 7:15
a.m., as long as they each carried a bell.
This petition was filed. The engineer
thought they were getting too many privi-
leges as it was, and if they were not soon
compelled to use lamps some bad accidents
would happen. Chas. A. Winter, on behalf
of the Provincial Choir Association, sent in
a communication to the board stating that
their third annual gathering would be held
this year. Sarnia had offered them very
acceptable terms and they wished to know
if they could secure the Western Fair
buildings and grounds and if any special in-
ducements could be given them to come to
London. Mayor Essery's motion that the
grounds and buildings be granted them,
allowing them to close the gates and charge
admission carried. The council's per-
mission giving No. 2 committee power to
portion the \$500 for band concerts was
referred to. The matter of granting
\$50 for dredging the river was referred back
to the committee to learn if the part of the
river to be deepened was in the city limits.
The committee stated that the portion of
the river was outside the city limits, but
recommended that the \$50 be granted as a
gift to the petitioners to help in clearing
the river channel. Considerable discussion
was raised over the price paid for electric
lighting in the agricultural building,
which is used for drill purposes. It was
moved that the parties using the hall pay
the cost to the city. Tenders were re-
ceived for the construction of the Waterloo
street sewer. The tender of Moses Cox for
\$139, gully holes, \$15 50, and man holes,
\$15 50, was accepted on condition that the
tender is properly signed. A large number
of accounts and the pay sheet, amounting
to \$403 53, were passed.

he is not legally bound to keep up half the
line fence, but he cannot legally remove it
without giving six months' notice to B.
Cattle running at large in the city is con-
trary to the by-laws, and therefore unlaw-
ful. The owners of the cattle are liable to
