The Colorado Sunk While Entering the New York Harbor-No Lives Lost.

San Francisco, Cal., July 15 .- The steamer Columbia, of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company (Capt. Clarke) went ashore about 8 o'clock yesterday morning during a thick fog at Pigeon Point, a rocky projection, about halfway between San Francisco and Santa Cruz. The big steamer was on her way from Panama to San Francisco. The latest advices from the scene of the accident state that the Columbia is in a very dangerous position, severely pounding the rocks, and if she is not soon lightened will go to pieces. The Columbia is a new ship, and of the latest additions to the Pacific fleet of the mail company. She was built in Chester, Pa., in 1892, and is of 3,296 tons burden.

A brief dispatch from Picadero states that the Columbia's passengers. 63 in number, and her crew of 90, had all been safely landed. The vessel is pounding on the rocks, and will in all probability be a total wreck. She has on board a mixed cargo, the value of which cannot be ascertained until the bills of lading arrive.
