Meteorological Office, Toronto, Sept. 5, 11 p.m.—An area of high pressure, attended by lower temperature, is moving slowly eastward from the Pacific Ocean. It has reached Dakota and Nebraska, is likely to extend its influence soon to the lake district, and is already giving quite cool weather in the Northwest. Local rains have occurred in Ontario; elsewhere the weather is fair throughout the Dominion. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Kamloops, 46-74; Battleford, 46-52; Qu'Appelle, 40-59; Winnipeg, 40-66; Port Arthur, 46-74; Parry Sound, 58-78; Toronto, 64-72; Ottawa, 56-74; Montreal, 64-76; Quebec, 60-72; Halifax, 62-82.

Probabilities.—Toronto, Sept. 6, 1 a.m.—Lower lakes: Winds, mostly southwest and southeasterly, generally fair, a few local showers; not much change in temperature. MEAGHER'S DEATH

Remarkable Story Told by a Neighbor of Deceased.

An Indian Who Said He Had to Kill a Man—Detectives on the Case.

Port Lambton, Sept. 6.—Patrick Meagher's body was buried on Saturday and the mystery surrounding his death is still undisputed.

At the inquest last night a young neighbor of the Meagher family, named Mills, requested to be sworn, and told the jury a most remarkable story of meeting an Indian named Angus at Algoma on the day on which Meagher disappeared, and Mills, the witness, said that he bought a boat from the Indian for the sum of \$1, and got into the craft, but Angus and another Indian threw him out into the water. Then Angus said to him: "You don't want this boat for a short time, do you? I am going to kill a man between 3 and 4 o'clock." Mills was positive as to the statement, and said that the companion of the Indian, who is very little known here, was a witness to the remark. The two men then took the boat and went away. Mills asked them to buy it back, but never saw them again. He said he thought nothing of what had occurred until he heard of Meagher's death. The jury returned a verdict of death from an unknown cause. Detective Yortell, of Sarula, who has the case in hand will probably make some further investigations.

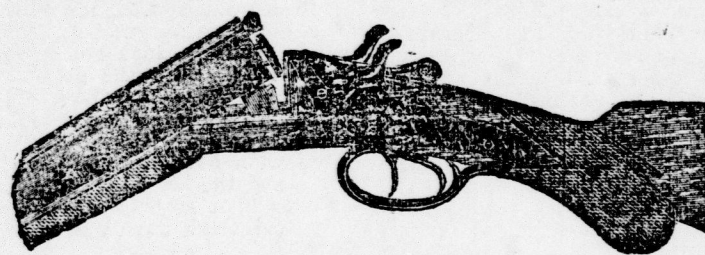
