SOMETHING IN THE WIND.

A Full Council Meeting of the British Cabinet.

Members Summoned From the Continent to Attend-Said to Be About Naval Expenditures.

London, Jan. 10.—A Cabinet Council was held at noon today. It is believed that the chief topic was that of naval expenditures, upon which Lord Rosebery, Sir Wm. Harcourt and Earl Spencer conferred last week. Lord Rosebery and Earl Spencer at that conference favored the expenditure for 1895 of an amount equal to that expended in 1894 for the purpose for building war-ships. This was opposed by Sir Wm. Harcourt, as he was expecting a budget strplus and wished to effect economies and popular reforms. No agreement being reached it was decided to call a Cabinet meeting at as early a date as possible in order to take the sense of the members on the question. Consequently the members of the Cabinet who were abroad are sum-

moned home. The council adjourned at 1:50 p.m. After adjournment Sir William Harcourt took luncheon with Sir George O. Trevelyan and Henry H. Fowler, respectively Secretary for Scotland and Secretary for India. All of the members of the Cabinet were present at the meeting. Arnold Morley, Post-master-General, was summoned from Monte Carlo, and G. Shaw-Lefebre, president of the Local Government Board, was recalled from Cannes, whither they had gone last week, intending to remain until the endof the month. Both arrived here by special train last evening.

QUERIES ANSWERED.

HOLIDAY .- Can a man working by the month for six or eight months claim legal holidays? Ans .- Sundays and such other holidays as are observed by his employer he can claim to the extent of being relieved from all unnecessary labor, but farm servants, like domestic servants, have no absolute holidays except by consent or

agreement. WILL-Can a man having no children by present wife will all his property, consisting of household effects, stock on farm, money in bank, mortgages and notes of hand so that no claims can be made by his wife? ANS .- Yes, but he cannot deprive her of dower in any real estate he may have. 2. -What claim would her present husband have on her real and personal property in case of her death, she having children by her first husband? ANS .- He would take

one-third if she made no will. CEDAR SPRINGS. - At an election of school trustees in a rural section when a poll is granted every assessed ratepayer in the section is entitled to vote. A widow who is not assessed cannot vote. A woman separated from her husband, but who is assessed, can vote. Farmers' sons assessed as joint owners can vote. Young whose names are on the Dominion voters' list, but who are not assessed, cannot vote. If the election is irregular or illegal, complaint must be made in writing by a ratepayer to the inspector within twenty days after the election meeting. The inspector will then investigate and confirm or set

aside the election. PARKHILL.-The council has passed a bylaw that on all taxes unpaid after Dec. 15, 1894, will be a charge of 5 cents on the dollar, that is 5 per cent interest. If those taxes are paid in one day or two days or a longer period after Dec. 15 they charge you the full 5 cents on the dollar, the same as a year's interest. How long can a property owner hold his taxes at this rate of interest they are charging? Ans .- The bylaw provides for a percentage charge of per cent under the authority of the statute. It is a penalty, not interest, and the property owner does not thereby gain any further time in which to pay his taxes. It is the duty of the collector to collect the

LONDON WESTER. - We do not know of any loan company organized by the Provincial Government to lend money at lowest rates to farmers for tile draining and therefore cannot give you the addres: of the office of the company as you request Under the act respecting tile, stone and timber drainage debentures, chap. 38, Revised Statutes of Ontario, which was passed by the Mowat Government, the councils of towns, villages and townships may issue debentures bearing 5 per cent interest which debentures are purchased by the Government and the councils may lend the moneys so raised to property owners in sums of not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000 to any one person, to be repaid in 20 years. The further details will be found in the act which is probably what you read of at the term of the last Provincial general

election. PRESCOTT.-About seven years ago B put up on posts a cheese factory on corner of a farm owned by A. B sells factory to C; B has never paid any rent. Can A collect any rent now from B, or can he come on C for back rent? Can A hinder C from moving building to adjoining lot? Can A compel either B or C to clear land of building and stone road made on the land? ANS.—If there was any agreement for rent A may now distrain upon the premises or sue B. If there was no agreement for removal of the building he may restrain it being removed and secure possession of the property with the building on it. In the absence of agreement he cannot compel the removal of the building and the stone road. The facts are not sufficiently stated. Better consult a lawyer specially.
