SCORED BY MR. MOODY.

Lincoln Park Commissioners Advised to Observe the Sabbath.

CHICAGO, Jan. 31.—Dwight L. Moody uttered some decisive words the other morning about the Lincoln Park commissioners and their connection with the fostering of Sabbath breaking. He denounced them in words that were not minced, and declared it to be a shame that the good people of Chicago would tolerate such an unchristian management of one of the great parks of the city.

The denunciation of the commissioners was incidental to the presence of the Moody battalion in the morning service. The battalion was there, uniformed and in a body. It was a welcome to their patron and friend. Mr. Moody addressed "my boys," as he fondly called them, in a short address prior to the beginning of the sermon. Saturday the battalion and its young friends had come to the park to skate. They were forbidden to do this, however, by the park policemen. They were told that the ice must not be skated upon as it was desired to have it in first-class condition Sunday. This reached Mr. Moody's ears.

"These boys have only one holiday," he said. "Sunday to them is not a holiday in the ordinary sense of the word. It is a sacred day. However, the Lincoln Park commissioners do not regard it as such. They cater to those who would break down the park's Sabbath. It is a disgrace to this fair city that such a management of the park is permitted. Refuse to allow the children that come from Christian homes to use the ice on the only day that is allowed them from the school work for innocent pleasure. The ice must be kept in good condition for those who heedlessly desecrate the Sabbath. It is a wrong that should be remedied or the Lincoln Park management called to account for its actions."

Remarks were received with evident approval by the audience.

DEFAUDING THE CUSTOMS.

Serious Charges Against a Government Official at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—In the police court this morning Thomas J. Waters, acting commissioner of customs, appeared, being charged with having appropriated at different periods the sum of \$543 of the Department of Customs for his own personal use. Mr. Hogg appeared for the Dominion Government and A. Ferguson, Q.C., appeared for Waters. There was no evidence taken. The case was put down for hearing on Feb. 7. Waters was released on bail, himself in \$2,000 and two sureties, Joseph Kavanagh and James Baber in \$1,500 each.

Waters gives an emphatic denial to the charge, saying that the Government's money was appropriated by the Receiver-General or was to do so at a moment's notice.

London Humane Society Order an Examination of the Horses.

Sensational Reports by the Investigating Committee.

Ninety-Three Horses Examined—Two Veterinarians Say Only 41 Are in Fair Condition—33 Unfit for Work—20 Moderately Good—The Society's Recommendation—Not Enough Horses.

The following has been handed in for publication by the London Humane Society:

"Veterinary Surgeons John D. O'Neill and B. F. Butler, together with Mr. John Riggs, dropped in upon the street railway company at its stables last Friday, backed with authority from the local Royal Canadian Humane Society, to investigate the condition and treatment of the horses in the employ of the company.

"For the matter had grown to be a serious one, and had been the subject of earnest discussion at the last meeting of the society's board of management, the outcome of which was that Mr. Fred Matthews was asked to arrange for a competent committee of inquiry, composed of gentlemen not actively identified with the work of the society. The persons named were willing and generously contributed their services and made a thorough examination of every one of the 93 horses then in stall. They also made inquiries into all matters pertaining to the care and treatment of the animals. They submit two reports—Messrs. O'Neill and Butler joining in one, and Mr. Riggs presenting the other. These reports are here given, in brief, less our readers will perceive them earnestly, and will regret that the day has not yet arrived when London can do away with the bob-tail horse car.

THE VETERINARIAN'S REPORT.

"To the president and members of the Humane Society, London:

"At your request we visited, in company with Mr. John Riggs, the stables of the London Street Railway Company on the 25th inst., for the purpose of examining the stables and the horses in the service. We hereby submit the following report:

"The officials in charge were courteous, and rendered every assistance in the showing of the stock.

"The stables are clean and well supplied with litter (bedding).

"The feed room contains ample supply of good strong food and the ration is liberal, according to the report of the superintendent of that department.

"The attendants do their duty in the matter of feeding, grooming, etc., to make the animals comfortable.

"There are 105 horses in the service, 93 of which were examined.

"Twenty of these are unfit for work, and should not be worked.

"Ten show marks of having interfered.

"Four show marks of recent date and should not be worked.

"Seven are in the hospital under treatment.

"One horse had a wart on one fetlock. This should be placed in the hospital, and the wart removed, and in the meantime this animal would be fit for service, and would not present that unsightly appearance so disgusting to the public.

"Twenty are suitable for doing a moderate amount of work, with great care.

"Forty-one are in fair condition and fit to do service.

"Any of those 32 animals reported 'not working,' in the hospital or out of it are being worked, we consider it cruelty to animals.

"Taking into consideration the amount of work to be done, it appears that there is not a sufficient number of able-bodied horses in the service to perform the work required by them.

"All of which is respectfully submitted.

MR. RIGGS' REPORT.

"To the president and members of the Humane Society, London:

"Yesterday afternoon, at the request of your society, in company with Dr. O'Neill, V. S., and Dr. Butler, V. S., I visited the stables of the London Street Railway Company, for the purpose of inspecting and reporting upon the condition of their horses, and having made a careful examination of about 90 animals, I beg to report as follows:

"I found about twenty horses which by reason of their extreme age, worn-out condition, and suffering from chronic and other lameness, are totally unfit for street car or any other kind of service, whatever, and I consider it gross cruelty to use these horses on street cars, in my judgment these horses ought either to be placed in hospital, or, better, destroyed forthwith.

"About 40 horses are in rather poor condition, many of them considerably worn, slightly lame, and scarred, and bruised from interfering and other causes. This class I consider with good stable treatment and careful driving to be capable of a moderate amount of work.

"The other and remaining animals, about 30 in number, I found to be in very fair order and fit for work.

THE SOCIETY'S RECOMMENDATION.

"The local Humane Society will now take immediate action on these reports. It asks that the public desist as much as possible from using the cars, and in this way 'talk business' to the company, show its disapprobation of its conduct, and incidentally relieve the horses.

"Ex-President Perrin, who was present with the committee, did not present a report, it having been decided that the reports should be from those not members of the management board."

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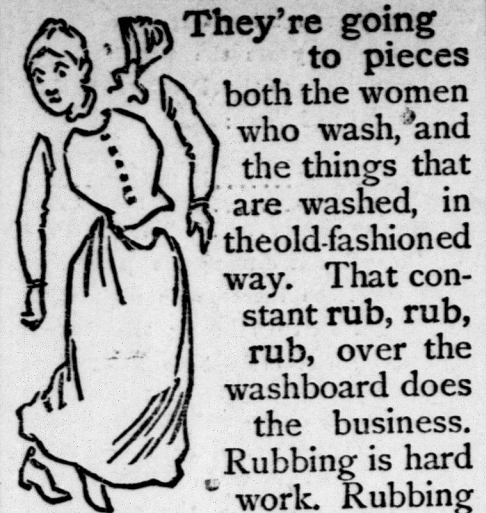
