The Hazelton Amazons Outflank the Soldiers.

Further Complications in the Strike Situation--Warrants Issued for the Arrest of Deputies Wao Did the Recent Shooting.

Hazelton, Pa., Sept. 21.--The strike situation has assumed an uncertain phase. An attempt to resume work was made at Pardee's Lattimer mines, but only 300 out of 1,300 miners returned to work. These were mainly Italians, with a few English-speaking men. During the night the Hungarians paraded through the settlement, beating tin cans and kettles. This was done to notify the men that they must not go to work. The strike was answered, and in the morning a band of Hungarians, led by women, were marching and threatening to march on the mines later in the day.

News of a disturbance at Reikley reached brigade headquarters yesterday. The workmen there had fixed the day for the decision whether or not to strike. About half the strikers attempted to return, and the others gathered about the mines in a menacing manner.

Companies C and E, of the Fourth Regiment, were sent over, and gave the would-be-worshippers protection. The men at Drifton and Jeddo, in the same district, did not go out. The 2,500 miners in the Lehigh and Wilkes-Barre McKees mines kept their word, and returned to work under military protection.

Topoka, Kansas, Sept. 21.--Chas. J. Devlin, the big coal mine operator in Illinois, and one of the largest individual operators in the United States, stands by the miners who are fighting for living wages. He said: "The miners of Illinois should get a price equal to the Columbus scale. The price which they were forced to accept last May, and which they refused to continue work on, is not enough to keep body and soul together."

At the City Council.

A Busy Session of the Aldermen Last Night.

Tenders for Four More Sewer Sections To Be Called For.

A Criticism of the Market Clerk--The Dundas Street Sewer--That Private Street Watering--The Jubilee Committee Asked to Report--Market Changes--By-laws Passed.

The aldermen shivered for about three hours in the city hall last night, except when an occasional tilt between individual members warmed things up a bit. It was the first council meeting since August, and a good deal of miscellaneous, though not sensational, business had accumulated. The mayor was in the chair, and all the members were present.

THE DUNDAS STREET SEWER. City Engineer Graydon reported that the Dundas street sewer was now clear of obstructions, with the exception of sand in the bottom. It was found that cement had not been used in some of the joints, and that other parts had been entirely with roots. The sewer had not been originally laid at a proper level. He recommended a manhole at Burwell street. It was flushed regularly the sewer would last for years to come.

Ald. Parnell said the sewer had been made as good as it ever was, which was not saying much. He recommended that the matter go to No. 2 committee to make the necessary repairs.

Ald. Winnett said there was little use of patching up the sewer, as the sand was packed so hard in the bottom that it could not be moved if flushed from now to doomsday.

Ald. O'Meara favored a new sewer, which the ratepayers on the street were well able to pay for, he said.

The matter was sent to No. 2 to complete the improvement.

THAT STREET WATERING. The city engineer reported that it was he who had given the contractors permission to water those streets which were not watered by the city water supply.

Ald. Nutkins said to what he called "gnawing and cracking" at city officials. He showed the market clerk, and Ald. Nutkins said he had no petty spite against anyone, but he was supposed by the people to see that officials did their duty.

The account finally passed. The clause recommending that the market clerk be left over until next year led Ald. Bennett and Ald. Parnell to say they had been sitting aside in the spring for this purpose, but that Ald. Dreaney had diverted it to another work. Ald. Dreaney said this was a misrepresentation. The clause, however, carried.

OTHER CLAUSES dealt chiefly with tax exemptions.

THE WARD FOREMAN. Ald. Hunt brought in the report of the special committee which investigated the petition against Foreman Hamilton, of No. 4 ward. It reported that the entire hungry organization and produce conditions which lead to death--but are practically incurable by ordinary methods of medical practice after they have become firmly rooted in the system.

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Clause carried. The communication of Mrs. W. A. Windsor, re damming and raising of sidewalk in front of 117 and 119 Wellington street, was filed.

Mrs. M. Barclay's petition was granted for a fall drain on Talbot street, from Lichfield street 150 feet southerly. The work will be begun as soon as the cost is deposited, day labor to be used.

It was recommended that unless the account against Mr. George T. Hiscox for an artificial stone walk on King street, opposite his new building, be settled forthwith, it be sent to the city solicitor to collect.

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The committee was empowered to call for tenders for a sewer on Bruce street from the Wharmcliffe road to Edward street.

The last clause recommended the adoption of his engineer's suggestion that all connections with the sewers and all private claims from said connections be made only by corporation men, and that a bylaw to this effect be prepared, said bylaw to give in detail the manner in which the sewerage will not be permitted to be opened under any consideration, and also to provide for the abandonment of all deposits except on permanent roads, which in all such cases must be \$50.

THE FINANCE COMMITTEE. Ald. Bennett presented the report of the finance committee. A bill from Wm. Hill for \$16 for cleaning the market evoked a criticism from Ald. Cooper. He thought the market clerk should have done his work. He was hanging around doing nothing, when the dust and dirt were something awful. The clerk practically got \$4 a day for doing nothing.
