Good Progress Toward Pekin

But Cannot Be Maintained at Present Rapid Rate.

Both Sides Suffering Severe Losses—News of the Capture of Yang Tsun Confirmed—Important Position Gained—Allied Army Will Be 50,000 Strong by Aug. 15.

London, Friday, Aug. 10, 4 a.m.—In the capture of Yang Tsung, the losses of the allies, according to a dispatch to the Daily Express from Che Foo, dated Aug. 8, purporting to give an account of that engagement, were 200, the majority of them being killed.

"The allies marched on Yang Tsung," says the report, "at dawn Monday. The position held by 1,500 Chinese was well entrenched to the east of the river. After four hours' heavy fighting the Chinese were driven from their defense works."

Another dispatch to the same paper, dated Tien Tsun, Aug. 6, reports a reconnaissance that morning beyond Heik, the result being that the army was developed in strong force, well fortified at Wei Ho. The Chinese were superior in numbers, and after facing the fire of seven guns, the Japanese retired to Heik with three killed and 27 wounded, but having captured 200 horses.

With the exception of these messages, Gen. Chaffee's report is the only account published by the London morning papers telling of the capture of Yang Tsung.

RAPID PROGRESS.
The editorials generally incline to view the progress toward Pekin as thus far splendid, but one which cannot be maintained at the present rapid rate, as the concentration of supplies and the establishment of bases all cause inevitable delays.

The Advance.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—The following dispatch has been received at the war department from Gen. Chaffee, sent via Che Foo:

"Yang Tsung, Aug. 6.—Yang Tsung occupied today. Wounded—Second Lieutenant Frank R. Long, 9th Infantry, moderate. Casualties, about 200 men, 9th United States Infantry, 14th United States Infantry and Battery F, 50th United States Artillery. Nearly all from 14th Infantry. Names later. Many men prostrated by heat and fatigue. (Signed) Chaffee."

[Yang Tsung is the town which Gen. Chaffee indicated in his dispatch received late yesterday as being the objective of the international forces on their then pending movement. It is at the junction of the Pei Ho and the railroad leading to Pekin. Its capture will insure to the international troops a second route of transportation to Pekin. It is 17.5 miles from Tien Tsun.]

Washington, Aug. 10.—The capture of Yang Tsun, the first objective point of the international forces, was the supreme news of importance received on the Chinese situation.

Lord of this capture, effected last Monday, came in the brief dispatch to the signal office at the war department from Col. Scriven, the signal officer at Che Foo. Half an hour after this came the cablegram from Gen. Chaffee, giving details of the details of the capture, and showing that it had been at the cost of about 60 casualties among the American troops.

ALLIES 50,000 STRONG.
Hardly less important was the dispatch of Gen. Terauchi, second in command on the Japanese staff, sent to the war office of Japan, and transmitted to the legation here, stating that the international army would total 50,000 men on Aug. 15, at which time the real advance on Pekin would begin. The present movement of some 15,000 men doubtless is viewed in the light of a reconnaissance in force, or a main movement of 50,000 to follow on the 15th. This makes clear the meaning of Gen. Chaffee's dispatch that Yang Tsun was the objective point. The war department here has been considerably puzzled over this statement of an objective point far short of Pekin. It would appear, however, that Gen. Terauchi's dispatch that the first force of 15,000 men, having opened up communications to Yang Tsun, brought forward supplies and established this advance base, the way would then be clear for the advance of the larger force on the 15th. The capture of Yang Tsun is therefore an important strategic branch of the fast-maturing military plans. The place is

FROM BULLER.
Sir Redvers Buller reports the death from wounds of Capt. Welby, of the 18th Hussars, well known for his explorations in China and Tibet. Last year he explored parts of Abyssinia.

General Buller started Tuesday to co-operate against General Botha. He left the railway at Paardekop and marched 18 miles to Aamersfort, which he occupied after a running fight, in which he lost 25 wounded.

TOO MANY MULETEERS.
Washington, Aug. 10.—The department of state is in receipt of a dispatch from the consul-general of the United States at Cape Town, dated July 9, further relating to the shipment of American citizens as muleteers at New Orleans on British transports. In this instance Mr. Stowe remarks that he sends home free all who apply to him, but adds: "I no sooner clear one vessel than another comes into port with more Americans who have been so foolish as to ship with mules for this country. Over 500 have arrived, and further shipments of these muleteers ought to be prevented. The means used to obtain men at New Orleans as told me by the men are simply disgraceful."

The Canadians

MORE COMPLAINTS.
London, Aug. 10.—Various complaints are published in the morning papers from the Canadians invalided to England from South Africa, regarding the lack of arrangements for their comfort and the delay in sending them home.

The Morning Leader says: "The Canadians invalided, who sailed from Liverpool for Montreal yesterday by the Allan liner Parisian, expressed their disappointment at the neglect of the military authorities in Liverpool. They said that having experienced the life of the British soldier under British officers, they had resolved to stay at home and to mind their own business in the future. Moreover, they promised to lay the facts before the Canadian ministers on board the Parisian."

The Times today publishes a letter written by a Canadian veteran, No. 7223, Y. Odlum, of the 22nd Oxford Rifles, Ontario, Canada, complaining bitterly for himself and his comrades, about the delay in sending convalescent Canadians home. He claims that they have waited long and patiently, but cannot get the authorities to act. Mr. Odlum says that they enlisted for active service, not for an idle, useless life in England.

This is perfectly true. Lord Strathcona has done all he possibly could for the Canadians, but by his strong, personal, persistent calling at the war office has been able to get any Canadians shipped. The great mistake of the war office is in granting any furloughs to Canadians. But really the real cause of the delay in the war office is most irritating. It was only by the efforts of Canadian officials that passage was secured for Canadians at Shorncliffe and Woolwich.

NOTES.
Two hundred and thirty-three prisoners of war from South Africa have arrived at Colombo, Ceylon. Their ultimate destination is New York. One hundred and twenty-three of them are Boers, 22 Irish-Americans, and 88 Germans and Hollanders.

The British war office reports that Pte. Simmill, of C squadron, Strathcona Horse, died at Cape Town on July 24. He was an Englishman.
