—Miss Ida Fortner, of Strathroy, is visiting friends in East London.

—Harry Casson, of Ft. Edward, is the guest of his brother, F. Casson, of the G. T. R.

—Mr. William O'Callaghan left today for his home in Larnar, N. D., after having spent a month visiting his mother in South London.

—Some men who were excavating on the site of the old barn at the rear of the O'Callaghan terrace yesterday unearthed a coffin containing a human frame.

—Mrs. Wm. Allen Young and her mother, Mrs. Mary Allen Young, who have gone to Niagara-on-the-Lake, where Mr. Young has taken a cottage for the summer months.

—G. & R. Burns have been awarded the contract for the new uniforms for the Seventh Battalion Band, which will be got up in next style. They expect to have them complete in about two weeks.

—A policeman found two well dressed young women sleeping underneath a tree in Victoria Park, early yesterday morning. After a considerable shaking they were sent on their way greatly embarrassed.

—The Bishop of Huron returned to this city via the G. T. R. 6:50 train last evening, after a prolonged trip to the Holy Land. He was met at the station by quite a crowd and welcomed home most heartily.

—The Free Library Board met last evening. Messrs. Reid, Burrell, Keene, Dignan and Marks were present. They decided to draw up a manifesto in order that the citizens may know their exact position.

—Mayor Esery, Ald. Moule, Ald. Coe and City Engineer Graydon are conferring with Engineer Jennings, of Toronto, on the condition of the L. and P. S. R. with regard to what should be claimed from the G. T. R.

—The room of the recently erected public school on Quebec street, was opened yesterday morning for the reception of pupils. Miss McMechan was in charge. This move will relieve the lower divisions of Lorne avenue and Rectory street schools.

—Miss Georgie Dobie and Miss Edith Rogers, pupils of Mr. W. Caven Barron, director of the London Conservatory of Music, are among those who take part in the closing exercises of the conservatory, to be held in Victoria Hall, London, June 22.—[Gloucester Transcript.]

—The Cleveland Press says that several capitalists there think of establishing a steamship service between Cleveland and Port Stanley with a capital of \$2,000,000. They propose running two fine passenger and freight boats and building offices at Port Stanley. Nothing could be done this season, however.

—London Council, No. 75, Canadian Order of Chosen Friends, this city, have purchased from Mr. John Dillaway, florist, a beautiful floral harp, on which is inscribed "Our Chosen Friend." It will be forwarded to the widow of late G. T. R. conductor.

—Mr. G. E. Coombs, who has for fifteen years acted as book-keeper in the Free Press office, has accepted a similar position in the London Printing and Lithographing Company. His former confederates presented him with a dinner and an address to mark his departure and their esteem.

—The garden party last evening at the residence of Mr. W. Wyatt was quite a success. The grounds were beautifully decorated with Chinese lanterns. The Italian band rendered good music, and instrumental solos were given by Mr. Innes and Miss Bryant. Colborne Street Methodist Church will profit thereby.

—Dr. W. W. Barkwell, of Chicago, left by the evening train for Montreal, where he will sail by the Labrador for London, Eng. He will take charge of his brother's (Dr. R. Herbert Barkwell) practice for three months, while the latter will come over to visit his brother, W. S. B. Barkwell, of this city, and other friends in Canada and the United States.

—Sergeant Maguire found a horse roaming around the city streets yesterday morning and started it off to pound. At Queen's Park he left the horse to go over to the caretaker's for the key. When he got back the horse, a beautiful black beast, was dead. It turned out to be the property of Contractor Crawford Becket. He valued the animal at \$150. Inflammation is given as the cause of death.

—Mr. John Hedge, who at present resides with Mr. John Lambourn, of Birr, is probably the oldest man living in London township. He has reached the old age of 99 years, and is still hale and hearty. He served in the Waterloo and Crimea battles, and is able to handle a gun remarkably well for a man of his years.—[Embro Courier.]

—There is one, at least, older person in the township—Mrs. McLaren, near Springbank. She will be 104 next birthday.

—Some time last February Mr. Edward Taylor, city, out of pity, took in and fed and lodged a youth named William Brennan. The lad enjoyed his hospitality

for some time and then went west. Mr. Taylor missed \$40 at the time, and he suspected that the money had gone with the boy. Brennan was up at the real estate sale yesterday and was noticed by the police, who gathered him in a little later on, on Richmond street.

About the English Fair.
The special meeting of the Protestant Orphans' Home Board, held yesterday afternoon, was largely attended.

Those present had evidently anticipated hearing a statement of the financial outcome of the recent fair. They were disappointed. The returns have not all been made, and very little was said regarding this question.

It is understood, however, that the \$2,000 mark has been closely approached. A standing vote of thanks was Monday to all who assisted the enterprise. It was decided to sell the scenery.

Camp Echoes.
To-day finds the camping ground almost covered with a silent city of white. No. 1 Company are expert tent pitchers, and sorry for it. They boiled and perspired, and borrowed chewing tobacco all day long in the sun. Very Sudden Death.
About noon to-day Mrs. Hayden, wife of Conductor John M. Hayden, of the G. T. R., died very suddenly and under peculiar circumstances. Shortly after commencing her household duties this morning Mrs. Hayden, who is about 27 years of age, was taken with severe pains in the region of the stomach. She became rapidly worse, and medical aid was sent for, and shortly after 12 o'clock Dr. Anderson arrived at the house, but found the woman dead. Before 1 o'clock Dr. Macdonald arrived, and he ordered an inquest. The lips of the deceased were greatly discolored, and the swollen appearance of the face and neck led the coroner to think that death might have resulted from suffocation. The husband of the deceased is in London, but is expected home to-night.—[Hamilton Times, June 15.]

The Board of Works met last evening, Ald. Garratt (chairman), Draneay, Taylor, Shaw and Coe, Mayor Esery, City Engineer Graydon and Secretary Bell being present. Catekater Grant, of Victoria Park, complained to the park his baton and handcuffs had been missing. Filed. Mayor Esery suggested that a contingent fund should be instituted to defray such expenses as snow-plowing. After some discussion it was decided to lay aside \$200 of the appropriation for each ward—\$1,200 in all. R. Kirkpatrick and C. F. Colwell had a grievance over the numbers of their adjacent stores on Dundas street, and as a result Mr. Colwell's store will be known as 187 1/2, Thomas & Buchner's letter regarding Maurice Baldwin's suit against the city was laid over.
