Resumption of Conference to Settle the Steel and Tin Plate Strike.

Pittsburg. July 12.-When the conference between the Amalgamated Association executive board and officials of the American Sheet, Steel Hoop and Tin Plate companies to settle the existing strike was resumed today. situation apparently had not changed from yesterday morning, although both sides appeared hopeful of ultimately reaching a settlement. Nothing could be learned from the conferees, however, as an agreement was made not to give out anything for publication until after the final adjournment.
