LOOPING THE LOOP

ON A BICYCLE

A Big Feature Engaged for the Toronto Exposition in September.

Hardy Downing, the professional bicycle rider, of San Jose, Cal., has accomplished the seemingly impossible. In defiance of the laws of gravity, like a fly creeping over the ceiling, he loops the loop on a bicycle, clinging to the track by his own velocity, his flying feet pointing towards the skies

and his head downward. The act is without doubt the most dangerous ever attempted on a bicycle. Similar attempts have been country, but the rider was in every case more or less guarded from acciwith a loop in the center perpendicular to the ground. The loop is built of wood, and the track is one foot in width for the entire distance. The track occupies the ground length of 250 feet, and from a height of 50 feet the intrepid rider comes down a run of 150 feet at the rate of 80 miles an hour. Then he strikes the loop 94 feet in circumference, the diameter of which he describes at the rate of a mile in 45 seconds. The whole thing is almost over before the amazed spectator has a chance to take a breath.
