Tooker's striking presence and his admirable gifts were both displayed to advantage in the role of Eldredge Grosvenor, the husband who believes himself to be wronged. Francis X. The comedy element was liberally supplied by Fred G. Edmund Ford, as Jack Hamilton, and Minnie Maude Allen as Sunnie, were equally amusing as the youthful bride and groom, though their parts might be advantageously shortened.
