

ONTARIO RETAILERS WILL FIGHT CHANGE OF THANKSGIVING DAY

Forty-Eight Ontario Branches
Will File Petitions—Central Board Active.

act for the Ontario retailers. Mr. Kingsmill and other local presidents are now in Toronto, conferring with Mr. Trowhern, secretary of the board, and in a few days there will be something doing. If the boards of trade and other associations petition the Ottawa Government, the retailers all over Ontario will send in scores of counter-petitions. There are 48 branches of the Retailers' Association in Ontario. On a day named by the central board they will all send in petitions to Ottawa. If the retailers all over Canada take the same line of action, which

of this city, and they say it as if they sincerely mean it.

The resolution passed by the Western Travelers' Association, which appeared in this paper on Wednesday, further roused the retailers into arms. The resolution was to the effect that the Dominion Government should be petitioned to change the day to Monday, as being much more convenient for the business interests of the country, and also giving a longer holiday to those participating. Monday, Oct. 23, is the day the travelers want.

The travelers forwarded a copy of their resolution to the local board of trade, and the council of the latter have agreed to consider that the portions and take the same line of action, which ada take the same line of action, which it is more than probable that they will the Secretary of State's desk will be piled high with papers demanding that Thanksgiving Day be celebrated on Thursday, as usual. The retailers are fective, as they will far outnumber those of their opponents.

In a nutshell, the claim of the retailers is this: Those who want the day changed are actuated only by motives of pleasure actuated by business motives.

The travelers forwarded a copy of their resolution to the local board of trade, and the council of the latter have agreed to act hand-in-glove with them in the matter.

If the board, as is probable, indorses the action of its council, it will draw up a resolution similar to that of the travelers and forward copies to the Secretary of State, to the Premier, and to Hon. Chas. S. Hyman. If other boards of trade, other travelers' associations and other societies take the matter up in the same way, there will be an organized movement all over Canada to change the day.

"What do you think of it?" The Advertiser asked Mr. T. F. Kingsmill, jun, president of the Retail Traders' Association of this city.

"We will oppose it tooth and nail," was the emphatic reply. "We have not objected to the Civic Holiday and Labor Day being held on Monday. When the 24th of May falls on a Monday we do not change the holiday to the middle of the week; but we are not going to allow Thanksgiving Day to be changed to a Monday if we can help it."
