These are the main facts in the medical testimony to be given at the coroner's inquest on the body of Miss Kinrade to be held on Wednesday evening, and ested. their relation will add a deeper tinge of mystery to the almost inexplicable chain of circumstances that surrounds the death of the girl.

The testimony of Dr. McNichol and the surgeons who performed the autopsy will show that a comparatively large quantity of blood flowed from the wound back of the right temple. There were in all seven wounds, three in the breast, one near the left ear, two in the lower jaw and the one in The shot thre h h the heart would cause almost instant death and the circulation of blood would practically cease. It was reported that a pool of blood was found under the body, but this is not correct, as the blood was under the shoulder, and had obviously trickled down from the head. The hair of the dead girl was also soaked, and as no large vessel was severed, the bleeding must have continued for a not inconsiderable space of time. Some time must therefore have elapsed between the firing of the shot into the head and that into the heart. From the quantity of blood found, this period must have been between ten and fifteen minutes in duration, and the inference would be that the shots in the head did not do as much damage as was anticipated, and the assassin was compelled to return to his ghastly job and complete it. None of the head wounds would have entailed a law apparently lodged in the throat. What then is the explanation of the long wait between the infliction of the wounds in the head and those in the breast? The murderer must have

Coming down stairs, she evidently received one bullet back of the right temple that cut Turning guickly she got another in the cheek near the left ear. The other shots were discharged at much closer range. The lower lip was blackened with powder, while the clothing in the region of the heart was burned through to the skin, the breast being exposed. BURNED AT STAKE

Rockwell, Texas, March 8.—After burning Andrew Ellis, a negro who attempted to assault Mrs. Arthur McKinney, at a stake in the public square of this little town late last night the crowd quickly dispersed. He was taken from the Rockwell jail and securely tied to a stake. Then cordwood was saturated with kerosene and piled about him, and upon his refusal to make a statement beyond admitting his guilt in the presence of Mrs. McKinney, who fully identified him as her assailant, the torch was applied. As the flames licked about him the man did not utter a cry nor show any symptoms of losing his nerve. He was dead in less than ten minutes.

Mrs. McKinney was seized in the back yard of her home early Friday morning by the negro, an employee of her husband's. She fought desperately, and the negro threatened to murder her if she revealed his attempted assault.
