

ONTARIO CROPS ARE ON THE MOVE

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Toronto, Oct. 19.—The movement of the Ontario grain crops has been quickened by the buying stations over the province all reporting increased deliveries. Bids for Ontario wheat were 2 cents under yesterday's and Manitoba wheat was offered at \$1.15, with \$1.14 the highest bid. The increased offerings of Manitoba wheat are bringing the margin of prices between Winnipeg and lake ports nearer to nominal levels. A few weeks hence the holders of what wheat stocks there were asked an advance of 7 cents to 9 cents on Manitoba cash prices and so light were supplies that buyers had to pay it. The margin is now back to about 6 cents. Flour continues quiet, no export sales whatever being effected. There is a little local business, and holders are getting very high figures, \$4.50 being asked. Quotations:

LOCAL MARKET.

Saturday, Oct. 19.
The market today was well attended as every part of the square was occupied, and the streets adjoining the market was utilized by the market clerk for the accommodation of those who came in with farm produce.
While there was no new features the market could be considered a good one, as sales were fairly brisk and prices were firm in nearly every line.
Grain—Oats were in good demand at \$1.15 to \$1.19 per cwt. Wheat steady at \$1.14 per bushel.
Hay and straw—A couple of loads of hay sold at \$18 and \$18.50 per ton. Several loads of straw was purchased for delivery next week at \$7.50 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—Butter was in large supply, but there was brisk demand at 26c for crocks, and 27c to 28c for choice pound rolls. In the dairy hall much higher prices were asked. Eggs were in good supply, and 25c to 26c per dozen for basket lots. In the dairy hall 28c to 32c per dozen was asked.

Vegetables and Roots—There was a large number of loads of potatoes offered, buying was brisk as the citizens have started to buy for the winter. Sales were made at 80c to 90c per bag, more selling at the higher figures. Beets, carrots and parsnips sold at 40c per bushel. Onions are dull at 90c per bushel. Turnips, 35c per bag. Celery, 40c per doz. Cauliflowers, 50c to \$1.25 per doz. Sage and savory, 20c per doz. Fruit—Apples sold at 70c to 81c per bag, or \$1.25 to \$2 per barrel; grapes, 25c to 30c per basket; peaches, \$1 to \$1.30, and a few baskets offering, quinces, 60c to 75c per basket; pears, \$1 to \$1.50 per bushel. Poultry—The supply was good, and the dealers made the following prices: Old hens, 50c per lb alive and 6c to 7c dressed; chickens, 10c per lb dressed; 7c to 8c dressed; turkeys, 10c to 12c per lb alive and dressed. Dressed Hogs—A large number of the fatted, which sold at \$3 to \$3.50 per cwt, nearly all at \$3.25.
Live Hogs—The price on Monday will be \$6 per cwt for select, which must weight 160 to 225 lbs; small pigs are dull, at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per cwt.
Butchers' Meats—Beef sold at \$5 to \$6.50; veal, \$8 to \$9; lamb, 11c to 12c per lb; pork, 5c for forequarters and 10c for hind-quarters.

Lotter Day Saints' Convention Elects Officers and Delegates —Church Is Flourishing.

A large number of delegates were in attendance at the opening session of the convention of Latter Day Saints, which was held yesterday in the Methodist Street Church.

The members and teachers of the Sunday school were present, and the work in that branch was discussed.

The reports read were most encouraging, and showed that great advancement had been made during the year.

Five new Sunday schools were built last year, making a total now of 46 schools in Ontario.

The membership has also increased considerably, being 1,557, as compared with 1,445 a year ago.

The superintendents of the district, Mrs. Margaret C. Stratford, and Mrs. Evans, of this city, were appointed a committee to see that in future the Sunday school work has a prominent place in the Canadian Messenger, the paper of the Sunday school.

PEACE DELEGATES END SITTING

Close Second World's Conference in Effort to Abolish War.

The Hague, Oct. 18.—The Hall of Knights presented an imposing spectacle today at the closing session of the international peace conference. The boxes specially erected for the occasion were filled to overflowing with cabinet ministers, diplomats and other statesmen and their wives in most attractive costumes.

The president, M. Nelidoff (Russia), made a long speech, saying that notwithstanding the assiduous work of the delegates, the conference had lasted longer than expected. He reviewed what had been done and the results attained, emphasizing the spirit of concord which had characterized the debates, observing that the pessimists forgot that the delegates were not sent to the Hague to find ideal solutions of the various problems discussed, but to carry out the instructions received from their respective countries.

Superior considerations such as the good of humanity in general must undoubtedly guide delegates to such a conference, but they must also keep in view the objects of those who direct the government, the interests of which are often diametrically opposed to the interests of other countries.

The efforts to establish an international high court of justice and obligatory arbitration were the result of theoretical combinations, which failed because they were practically insurmountable difficulties in their way; but instead, the international prize court would be one of the lasting monuments of the conference, and once applied, it would indirectly prevent the greater extension of war.
