BRITAIN'S NEW PATENT LAW. The new British patent act, which went into force on Friday last, is aimed at foreign manufacturers, particularly German, who take out patents in the United Kingdom without the least intention of working them.

According to the principal clause of the measure, unless patents thus obtained are manufactured to an "adequate extent" in the United Kingdom, the patent may be revoked. 
