

SHAUGHNESSY HINTS AT INCREASED PROFITS

Annual Meeting Shows Great System in Excellent Financial Shape.

Montreal, Oct. 5.—The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company was held at noon today at the company's headquarters, and the tone of the meeting was of a thoroughly optimistic character. Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president and chairman of the board of directors presided, and in the course of his remarks, reviewed the work of the company for the past year, pointing out that the earnings and development of the property of the shareholders were fully up to, and even in excess of expectations.

The most important announcement made was that the company's plans for the placing of larger and faster boats on the Atlantic service were practically completed, and that the directors expected to be able to complete an arrangement within the next few weeks. It was also announced that in future dividends would be paid quarterly instead of half yearly, and that the company would be able to increase its dividends shortly, though there would be no motion cutting. Referring to the financial position of the company in moving the adoption of the annual report, Sir Thomas pointed out that in addition to surplus earnings, there were other amounts in process of realization that might be roughly estimated at \$50,000,000, without taking into account unsold land, and this should be augmented substantially within the next few years.

PARKER MURDER TRIAL

Witnesses Swear Accused Had Had Trouble With Man Killed.

Bellevue, Oct. 5.—The Parker murder trial was continued here this morning before Hon. Sir Justice Macdougall and the prospects are it will not be concluded today, as the crown, when the court rose at 1 o'clock, had still a number of witnesses to call, and the defence also will call a number of witnesses. The majority of the witnesses called this morning swore there had been trouble between Masters and the prisoner. Parker was seen in the vicinity on the morning of the tragedy, and was carrying a gun. One witness, Jennie Hay, swore she saw Parker running away from near where Masters was shot. This was about 10:40, some time after it was alleged the shooting actually took place.

ASYLUM FOR LIFE

Albert Holmes, of Brockville, Charged With Murder Found Insane.

Brockville, Oct. 5.—The trial of Albert Holmes for the murder of Nathan Bolton, his cousin, near Cardinal, last April, was ended this afternoon. All the evidence went to show that he was insane when he was therefore discharged on the ground of insanity. He will be sent to the criminal asylum for life.

MAGANN TO FIGHT

Toronto Man Asks Federal Aid Against Hydro-Electric Commission.

Toronto, Oct. 5.—G. Plunkett Magann promises to make a fight against the hydro-electric commission before they put their transmission line two miles in the waters of his private harbor.

He says he has a Dominion Government order-in-council entitling him to navigable rights, and he argues that this is a higher authority than the powers given by the Ontario Legislature to the hydro-electric commission.

HUNDREDS HOMELESS

New Ontario Towns and Villages Completely Wiped Out by Fire.

Rainy River, Oct. 5.—Gracetown, a town on the border between Ontario and Minnesota, was completely wiped out by fire yesterday afternoon. The blaze started from a forest fire. The villages of Williams, Roosevelt, and Swift were also wiped out. More than 100 people are homeless. It is reported that a school teacher and a child were burned to death at Gracetown, and that the loss of the C. N. R. will be heavy. It is feared that some settlers may have perished also in the fire.

By direction of the King a raised brass plate has been placed in the dining-room at Osborne House to denote the spot where the late Queen Victoria lay in state. The plate bears the inscription: "Here, in peace, Queen Victoria lay in state awaiting burial at Windsor, Feb. 1 1911."

GENERAL MOTORS LOAN \$20,000,000

Financiers in East Will Control Till Notes Are Taken Up.

New York, Oct. 5.—Negotiations have been closed for the sale of \$15,000,000 of first lien six per cent five-year notes by the General Motors Company. These will be a part of a total authorized issue of \$20,000,000, the other \$5,000,000 to be reserved for future use. The notes will be redeemable at 102 1/2 and interest on any interest rate.

The proceeds of the issue will be used for taking up indebtedness of the General Motors Company and its subsidiaries, which amounts to about \$14,500,000. The new issue of notes will be brought out by J. and W. Seligman & Co., of this city, and Lee Higginson & Co., of Boston, but it is understood that other important banking houses are also interested in the transaction.

An important point in connection with the new financing of the company is that it embodies an agreement providing that the banking interests which furnished the money will be allowed to name a majority of the board of directors of the corporation until the notes are redeemed. The bankers will also name six out of seven members of the finance committee. This means that control of the corporation will be exercised by the banking interests during the sale of the note issue.

MOVE TO REDUCE TELEGRAPH RATES

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux Will Try and Get New Scale of Prices.

Ottawa, Oct. 5.—Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux will introduce a resolution at the next session of the House of Commons in regard to the reduction of telegraph messages in Canada, and it is stated that a material decrease in the prevailing rates is likely to be made in the near future. The new rates will probably be based upon the scale in use in Great Britain. Hon. Mr. Lemieux is now on his way home from South Africa, and it is stated that he will recommend that the minimum rate be 12 cents, and the maximum 15 cents, with comparative rates for distant messages. It is believed that this will result in largely increased business for the telegraph companies, and the success that the night telegraph letters have met with is pointed out in substantiation of this. The question of uniform rates for all over Canada has been considered, but it is not thought that the time for this radical change has yet arrived.

MORGAN CRITICIZED FOR WORLDLY MIND

Financier at P. E. Convention Keeps in Touch With Office.

Cincinnati, Oct. 5.—Some of the deputies here for the opening of the general convention of the Episcopal Church today were inclined to criticize J. Pierpont Morgan, a lay deputy from the diocese of New York, for keeping one eye on his office in Wall street, while devoting the other to the spiritual business of the church.

The criticism arose over Mr. Morgan's action in having a special wire run direct from the Dalva mansion, where he and his party are staying, to his offices in Wall street. The unfavorable comments originated with some members of the Pennsylvania delegation who were also inclined to criticize Mr. Morgan for the profuse way in which he is entertaining his guests at the Dalva house.

The Michigan delegation is not at all in sympathy with the criticism levelled at Mr. Morgan. Bishop Williams' private secretary, who was asked about the matter this afternoon, admitted that he had heard some "gossip," but was not inclined to repeat it at all seriously. He was positive it would not come before the convention in any form whatsoever.

ALL RED WIRELESS

British Government May Be Asked to Subsidize New Telegraph Service.

Georgetown, Oct. 5.—The Chamber of Commerce has resolved, in view of the report of the trade commission, to ask the British Government to subsidize a direct trans-Atlantic mail service by any company whatsoever.

The blue book issued in connection with the West Indies Trade Commission gives particulars of the proposal of the Pessenden Wireless Company for an "all-red wireless" route. The company believes it will eventually be able to take messages at half a penny a word between Great Britain, Canada, the West Indies, and Johannesburg.

TO FIGHT FOR TARIFF

Wealthy Conservative Members of British Commons to Battle.

London, Oct. 5.—One hundred wealthy Conservative members of both Houses have decided to endeavor to induce the party leaders not to stand aloof, but to take an active part in the propaganda work and also to urge them to exchange the present defensive policy for a definite constructive programme. Amongst other things it is strongly felt that the conference between Canada and the United States this month renders it imperative that the Unionist position on imperial preference should be made absolutely plain, it being feared that if the Liberal party hold the next colonial conference, the question of imperial consolidation will be practically destroyed, because the present Government cannot ask unspeakable adherence to free trade. The new body wants a strong lead and claims as its motto "Fight, fight, and go on fighting." The movement is significant in view of the fact that Mr. Balfour speaks at Edinburgh.

PECK DISMISSED

Prominent Professor Loses Place Through Breach of Promise Case.

New York, Oct. 5.—Dr. Harry Thurston Peck, one of the foremost Latin scholars of the world, and occupant of the Anthon chair of Latin at Columbia University, was dismissed by the university trustees this afternoon. Dr. Peck has been named as defendant in a \$100,000 breach of promise suit brought by Esther Peck, of Boston, and his dismissal is directly due to this suit and to subsequent developments which involved Dr. Peck in a controversy with President Butler of the university.

Although the resolution of the trustees terminates Dr. Peck's connection with the university "forthwith," he announced tonight that he would not relinquish his position without a legal fight. In consideration of his long service the board voted him a lump sum equivalent to his salary (\$5,000) for the current academic year. Immediately he was notified of the trustees' action Dr. Peck sent a letter of defiance, in part as follows: "I regard this action on your part as illegal and in violation of my contract with Columbia University. Inasmuch as you are acting in violation of the letter and spirit of the university charter and of my agreement with this institution, I insist on your carrying out your contract with me, and that you respect my contractual relations with the university."

MARINE

Ludington, Mich., Oct. 5.—The steamer S. C. Reynolds, which stranded on Big Point Sauble at 5 a.m., was released at 2:30 p.m., by the revenue cutter Tuscarora. The steamer, Pere Marquette 4 and 6 and the tug Sportman and Helen Taylor, The Reynolds went ashore in a fog and ran out two feet forward. She was loaded with packages and was en route to Buffalo. She is 250 feet long, 40 feet beam, and measures 1,800 gross tons, and is owned by the Union Steamboat Company, of Buffalo.

The large steamer and coast guard ran ashore on the beach only half a mile from the Reynolds at the same time, but released themselves without difficulty.

Agground in Fog

Frankfort, Mich., Oct. 5.—The steamer Rutland, of Ogdensburg, N. Y., ran on the beach, five miles north of here, last night in the dense fog. She was loaded with flour and canned goods and immense quantities of flour were thrown overboard, enabling her to float again. She cleared about ten o'clock this morning, apparently uninjured. All available craft in port and along the shore were busy covering and appropriating the flour and canned goods from the surf.

TO LET IT DROP

Railway Commission Will Not Make General Inquiry Into Telephone Rates.

Ottawa, Oct. 5.—The railway commission does not intend to deliver judgment on the general inquiry into telephone rates. This was learned today from a very authoritative source. The matter has been hanging fire for a long time. A few years ago an inquiry was had before Chairman Killam, and much evidence was taken. None of the present commission, except Dr. Mills, heard the evidence. It has been gone over by others, but since it was taken conditions have changed materially. The board is understood to be opposed to delivery of judgment in evidence which only one of its members heard, and it is not desired to open the inquiry. As a consequence judgment is not likely to be rendered at all.
