

## CONTROL BOARD TO BE ELECTED BY DIRECT VOTE

Committee to Discuss Proposed Change Will Recommend That Method.

CABINET AND COMMONS FOR CITY'S BUSINESS

Proposed That Board of Control Consist of First Four Aldermen Elected.

The committee to be named by the council at the next meeting to discuss the advisability of substituting a board of control for the present aldermanic system will recommend the method of the board's operation. In Toronto, Hamilton and other cit-

ies, the board is elected directly by the

Ald. Johnston will suggest, and it is robable that his idea will carry that the board consist of four members of the council and the mayor. The aldermen to be selected shall be the four standing highest in the vote for the aldermen at the January election. This will insure, in his judgment, the best quality in the council, and four as good men as can be chosen.

"That is my scheme," he stated to The Advertiser, "For instance, would have Ald. Robinson, Ald. Richter. Ald. Moore and Ald Wright this year. These four men, I think, would have given us good municipal government, and the conditions complained of would not have existed today. A small salary could be paid these men, say, \$5 a meeting, or something like that. # TAKES THE STAND AGAINST BECKER Says Police Officer Told Him

BRIDGIE WEBBER

That Rosenthal Must Be Killed.

AND THAT MURDERERS WOULD BE ALL RIGHT

More Sensational Evidence Produced at New York Murder Trial.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, Oct. 14. - Winfield R. Sheehan, secretary to Police Commissioner Waldo, was the first witness called when the trial of Becker was resumed today. His appearance was a distinct surprise.

Sheehan, who is a former newspaperman, was asked to identify his signature of a document handed to him by Assistant District Attorney Moss. The document was a communication, addressed to Becker, and attached thereto were letters identified by the witness as having been written by Becker, Sheehan said that he had signed the document at the direction of Commissioner Waldo.

"Did you ever talk to Becker about the matters mentioned in these com-munications "asked Mr. Moss. "No. sir." Sheehan answered.

On the ground that the commissioner's secretary had given only his "opinion" as to the authenticity Becker's signature, John W. Hart, of counsel for the defence, objected to the introduction of the papers in evidence. Justice Goff said he would sustain the objection unless the witness could make his identification more positive.

"Didn't you have a conversation with Commissioner Waldo on this very letter?" asked Mr. Moss, showing the witness one of the alleged Becker communication.

Witness said. "It might be" the signature, but said he could not remember all the letters that had come through his hands. Finally, after some sparring, Sheehan said: "I recognized that signature as the signature of al papers handed me by Charles Becker. To the best of my belief, that is Becker's signature. Justice Goff, refused, however, to tal-
