Athletics Win Another Close One From Naps, While Highlanders Take a Game From Chicago.

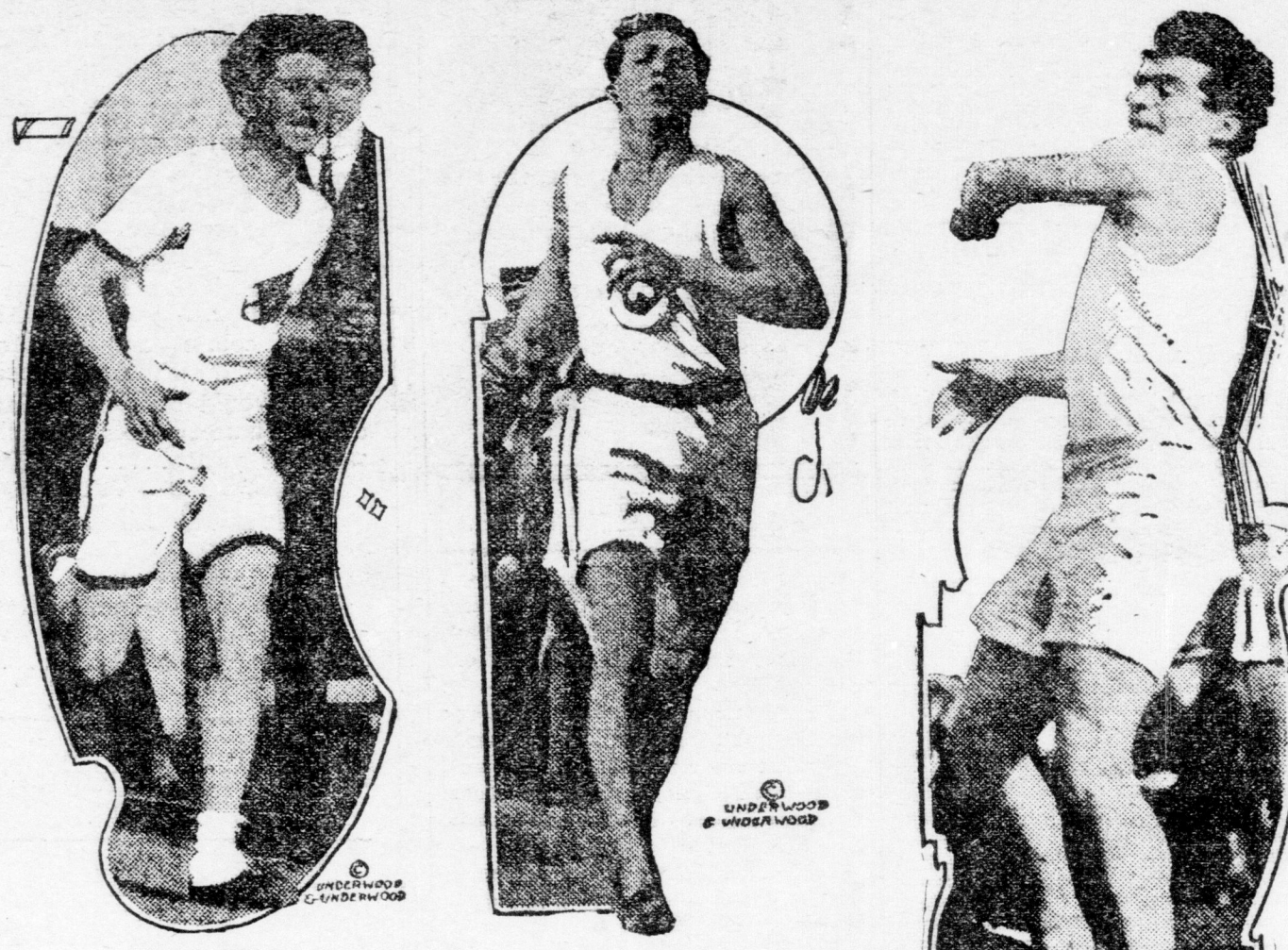

Three New World's Records in One Afternoon Make
Uncle Sam's Olympic Team Look Like Sure Winners

That Olympic team candidates are fast rounding into world-beating form was evidenced at the postoffice athletic games in New York, when three world's records fell before the onslaughts of men who will wear the red, white and blue shield in Stockholm.

The new records are the 1,500-metre run, won by Abel Kiviati in 3:59 1-5, who beat Harold Wilson's mark by 2-5 of a second.

Louis Scott broke the world's record in the 5,000-metre race, setting the figures at 15:06 2-5, clipping five seconds from the mark of Jean Bouin, the French record holder.

The big surprise was the marvelous discus hurling of Jim Duncan. He tossed the discus, Olympic style, 156 feet, 1 inch, from an 8-foot-2-inch circle. The missile cleared a picket fence, grazing the head of a woman spectator, who was supposed to be outside the danger zone. The day
