KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS VISITED ST. THOMAS

Forty Londoners Were Guests
Tuesday Night of Rath-
burn Lodge.

About forty members of the local lodges of the Knights of Pythias paid a visit last evening to Rathburn lodge, St. Thomas, on the occasion of the installation of the officers of the latter lodge. Bro. James Dean, of this city, had charge of the ceremonies, and was assisted by Bros. Bishop, Burdick, Tinsley, Threlkenton, Hussey and Grismond.

Upon the conclusion of the ceremonial refreshments were served, and the remainder of the evening was spent in a sociable manner. Speeches were made by Bros. Dean, Burdick, Bishop, Hussey, Ely, Bull and Grismond, of London, and Bros. Geddes, McDonald, McCollough and Horton, of St. Thomas. Bro. Horton, in his address, pointed out that the membership of the Knights of Pythias had exceeded the 800,000 mark, and that it was the intention of the officers of the organization to have 1,000,000 members by 1914, when the order will celebrate its 50th birthday.

That the order is progressing was shown by the hosts, and that a class of 2,000 will be initiated in Chicago on Feb. 17. Bros. O. Sinclair and Inwood, of London, rendered a number of musical selections during the evening that were heartily appreciated by the brethren.

WEST INDIES PREPARES FOR CANAL OPENING

Canadian Syndicate Behind a
Great Scheme to Supply
Shipping Facilities.

New York, Jan. 22.—A London cable says: The influence of the opening of the Panama Canal on British West Indian trade was indicated by a statement of the colonial secretary in the House of Commons yesterday. Replying to a question as to what preparations were being made in the British West Indian Islands to cope with the expected development of shipping in the Caribbean Sea consequent upon the opening of the canal, he said that the British Government, better equipped, docking and repairing facilities were available, the secretary said he had been informed that a Canadian syndicate was negotiating with the Jamaican Government with a view to the provision of facilities for harbor improvement schemes with other places, including Trinidad, under consideration, and proposals had been made for the establishment of oil storage stations at Barbadoes and St. Lucia.

BURIED AT ST. MARYS

John L. Maxwell Was One of Stone
Town's Leading Citizens.

St. Marys, Jan. 22.—The funeral of Mr. John L. Maxwell, who died after a long illness at the family residence on Wellington street south of St. Marys Cemetery, was largely attended. Mr. Maxwell was the travelling member of the firm of D. Maxwell & Sons, and was well known in the Dominion. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church and of St. James Lodge, A. F. and A. M., and St. James Chapter, O. E. S. He was survived by two daughters, the Misses Georgia and Helen, two brothers, James and David, and a sister, who reside in Glasgow, Scotland.

TURK ABOUT TO ACCEDE

Expected To Accept the Advice of the
Powers.

Paris, Jan. 22.—Special dispatches from both Constantinople and London agree that Turkey is on the eve of acceding to the advice of the powers as formulated in the note of Jan. 17. A dispatch to the Matin from Constantinople says that Turkish Pasha, the Turkish ambassador at St. Petersburg, has communicated to the Porte declarations made to him by M. Sazonoff, the Russian foreign minister, who strongly urged that Turkey give way at once. If Turkey dragged out the negotiations, he pointed out, she would endanger the political situation in Europe and Russia, above all desirous of consolidating the situation, would find herself obliged to compel Turkey to give in by occupying the vilayets of Van, Bitlis, Erzurum and Trebizond, and entering the straits. The Russian Government, he added, could not resist public opinion and demanded an immediate answer.

The Russian ambassador to Turkey, M. de Giers, has made similar representations to Kiamil Pasha at Constantinople, and M. Bompard, the French ambassador to Turkey, has advised the Premier to comply with Russia's suggestion.

WITTGENSTEIN DEAD.
Vienna, Jan. 22.—Karl Wittgenstein, who at one time controlled the whole Austrian iron industry, died yesterday. He was a great philanthropist and patron of arts.

CARUSO LOSES SUIT.

Turin, Italy, Jan. 22.—Enrico Caruso has lost the suit for defamation which he brought against the throat specialist, Dr. Della Vedova. He had alleged that the physician had calumniated him by telling reporters that he was in danger of completely losing his voice.

A NEW CRATER.

Guadalajara, Mexico, Jan. 22.—A new crater has formed on Colima, which continues its violent eruptions at intervals. Forest fires have occurred from the flow of lava, and crops over a wide area have been seriously damaged.

LEGAL QUERIES

TAXES.—Can the township legally collect on \$200 more than my notice of assessment calls for? If so, what becomes of my right of appeal? I did not appeal against amount stated in notice, but would have done so against any increase, but was not given any opportunity. The tax papers were handed in in December, just a few days before date due for payment, giving the first hint of increased assessment. I tendered the proper amount on my assessment at tax rate. It was refused, with the remark: "You must pay what is on our books." What action, if any, should I take in the matter?

A.—The collector is bound to collect the amount stated in his roll, which is binding, notwithstanding error in notice of assessment. Your remedy is to apply to the council to correct the error of the assessor or clerk.

YOUR NOTICE AND THE ROLL, by refunding to you the difference in the taxes, and if that is refused you might then sue the negligent official for damages.
