DUMMY RAID SUCCEEDS

Germans Brought Into the
Trenches and Battered
by Big Guns.

OTTAWA, Aug. 24.—The following communiqué has been received from the Canadian general representative at the front:

Canadian Army Headquarters in France, Aug. 24.—There were few outstanding features to the trench warfare of the last week. The bright moonlight interfered with the activity of our patrols. One night after a preliminary bombardment a small party from the Royal Canadian Regiment, under Lieut. Bole, approached the German trenches, but finding that the enemy was alert, our party threw bombs among the sentries and returned to their own trenches with the loss of only one man.

Upon another occasion a dummy raid in co-operation with the artillery was successfully carried out by a Toronto battalion. The enemy were led to believe that a raid was about to take place, and when they had manned their trenches in expectation of the attack our guns and trench mortars opened upon them a short but destructive bombardment.

During the week a visit was paid to the Canadian corps by Gen. Sir Sam Hughes. He addressed a number of the battalions on parade, and visited the various points of interest upon the corps area.

GERMANY HAS BLACKLIST OF DUTCH COMPANIES

Amsterdam, via London, Aug. 25.—The Nieuws Van Den Dagh says Germany has issued a blacklist of certain Dutch firms, which are denied German goods, and that Dutch merchants who supply the blacklisted firms with German goods are threatened with a similar boycott.

NORWEGIAN BOAT SUNK

LONDON, Aug. 24.—Lloyd's reports that the Norwegian steamer Velox, 177 tons, has been sunk in the North Sea. Her crew was landed. The Danish steamer Avanti, bound for the Thames with a cargo of wood pulp, was seized by a German torpedo boat.

TEUTONS STRENGTHENING ALONG THE DANUBE RIVER

Entrenching and Preparing Wire Entanglements on Rumanian Border.

[Canadian Press.]

LONDON, Aug. 25.—Three Austrian trains are arriving daily at Orsova (a Hungarian town on the Danube near the Serbian and Rumanian borders) with ammunition which is being conveyed in barges to Bulgarian ports lower down the Danube River, says a dispatch to the Daily Mail. A great quantity of explosives and medical supplies is being concentrated at Toplice, near Orsova, in which neighborhood the work of entrenching and preparing wire entanglements is proceeding energetically.

Two German generals with staff officers have arrived at Orsova, says the dispatch, for the purpose of inspecting the defences on the Rumanian frontier.

Germany has made urgent offers to the Rumanian export committee for the purchase of a portion of the new harvest. The committee has deferred its decision until Monday.

LUCKNOW CITIZEN IS FOUND IN BUSH WITH THROAT CUT

George Lees, Proprietor of
Woolen Mills, Evidently
Took Own Life.

LUCKNOW, Aug. 24.—With his throat cut from ear to ear and a blood-stained razor lying by his side the body of George Lees, proprietor of the local woolen mills, was found at noon today in Richard Webster's bush.

Mr. Lees had been missing from his home, where he lived with his two sisters, since early yesterday morning. When he did not return last evening search was made, but until noon today the searchers' efforts were unrewarded.

Mr. Lees had been in apparent good health and his sisters or friends here could not account for the rash deed. The woolen mills, while not a large concern, has been running and it has not been suspected that the owner was in financial straits.

TWO MORE GERMANS MAKE THEIR ESCAPE

Five Airtight Have Got Away From
Fort Henry This Summer.

KINGSTON, Aug. 24.—Two Germans made their escape from Fort Henry Wednesday afternoon. How is a mystery, and will be the subject of an investigation. The entire district is being searched for the men, who can speak good English. This makes five Germans who have got away from Fort Henry this summer. Early in June three men who were helping make some repairs to a motorboat, overpowered their guards and made across the border and were never located.

Yesterday four Germans were reported as having escaped from the camp at Amherst, N. S.

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NEW BRITISH PLANE TERROR OF FOKKERS; FASTEST IN WORLD

Have Accounted for 27 German
Machines at Front.

MAY DRIVE OFF ZEPPELS

Improvements Expected To
Give Them Advantage of
Airships.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—A new type of aeroplane, now being used by the British at the front, has already accounted for 27 Fokkers, according to a statement made by Baron Montagu, C. G. Grey, editor of the Aeroplane, gives the following description of this new aerial "destroyer."

"These small fighting machines are distinctly a British product, first being introduced by the Sopwith firm a year, or so before the war, and from that first experiment they have been developed and fitted with more and more powerful engines until today the British scout plane is the fastest thing in the world, except a projectile from a gun."

The German Fokker monoplane is a fast destroyer, but its success is limited to some extent.

May Drive Off Zeppels.

Mr. Grey concludes as follows: "The improvement in the British aeroplanes may eventually have a considerable effect on the air defence of this country, for the improvement in aeroplanes must necessarily be more rapid than the improvement in airships, and consequently it is quite probable that new types of destroyer aeroplanes may be produced which will make it almost impossible for airships to get away from this country, if they ever reach it. Improvements in climbing, speed, and power of aeroplanes have been so great that they can now reasonably be expected to outstrip an airship, and the speed of the best aeroplane has always been superior to that of the best contemporary airship. So that with these improvements in the organization of the defence stations it is not unlikely that even the most improved German airships may find it too expensive to continue to annoy the British Isles."

SIX ZEPPELINS IN
LATEST NIGHT RAID
ALONG EAST COAST

Three Persons Injured, Some
Fatally, But Little Material
Damage Done.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—11:15 a.m.—Three persons were killed and several injured by a zeppelin, which dropped a large number of bombs in the neighbourhood of a town on the southeast coast of England early today, says a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

Several houses were damaged. At another place on the southeast coast, many bombs were dropped. One fell into a railway station yard and demolished some railings, while another bomb completely wrecked a dairy nearby.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—11:15 a.m.—Details of the raid by hostile airships which crossed the east and southeast coast of England, between midnight and three o'clock this morning, as disclosed by the official statement of the war office shows that nine persons are reported to have been injured, some mortally. Other damage effected by the raiders is declared to have been slight. The announcement states:

Damage Was Slight.

"Six hostile airships raided the east and southeast coasts of England last night at intervals between midnight and three o'clock this morning. One airship made her way westward well inland. The remainder of the fleet carried out short incursions over the coast. The number of bombs dropped by the raiders has not yet been ascertained. Several bombs are reported to have been directed at ships at sea. The damage effected by the raid was slight.

Nine Persons Injured.

"In one locality, a railway station and some houses were damaged and two horses were killed. At another point two houses were wrecked.

"The total casualties have not yet been reported. To date, nine persons are reported injured, some fatally.

"Anti-aircraft guns came into action at certain points both on land and from ships at sea. Some of our aircraft went up in pursuit. One aeroplane succeeded in firing on a raider at close range, but she eluded her pursuers in the clouds. A further report will follow."

WINGHAM RACE TRACK

Some outside horsemen who have recently seen the track state that it is getting in splendid shape, and will be completed next week. Besides the races many other sports will be provided, and liberal prizes will be given by the businessmen of the town. The proverbial "greasy pig" will be chased, if not captured.

WILLEHAD AT NEW LONDON.

New London, Conn., Aug. 25.—The German steamer Willehad, which was interned at Boston at the outbreak of the European war and which sailed from Boston yesterday by way of Cape Cod Canal, arrived here this morning, having passed into Long Island Sound shortly before 10 o'clock. Heavy fog held up the steamer during the night, but the weather clearing at daybreak the Willehad proceeded here and came directly up the harbor to the new state pier, on which are new storage sheds of the Eastern Forwarding Company, the American agency for the German line of submersible merchantmen. It is expected the Willehad will be up there for an indefinite period of time.

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YOUNG TURK CHIEFS DRIVEN FROM CHURCH BY THE GRAND SHERIFF

Cut Off From the Orthodox
Mohammedanism.

ENVER PASHA IS NAMED

With Talaat Bey and Djemal
Pasha Is Held Responsible
For War.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—11:15 a.m.—The grand sheriff of Mecca, chief magistrate of the Holy City, who announced his independence of Ottoman rule in June and supported by Arab tribes, captured the Turkish garrison of Mecca and several other cities, has proclaimed a definite rupture between orthodox Mohammedans and those represented by the Committee of Union and Progress, which is now in power in Turkey.

In his proclamation, as forwarded from Cairo by Reuters' correspondent, the grand sheriff denounces Enver Pasha, Talaat Bey and Djemal Pasha, Young Turk leaders, staunch supporters of Enver and among the most powerful figures in Turkey. Djemal Pasha is commander of the Turkish forces in Syria, and is reported to have adopted severe measures to crush the revolution.

Denounces Young Turks.

The proclamation of the grand sheriff addressed to "all our Moslem brothers," follows:

"We were one with the Government until the undolants appeared. Since then we have been driven into this fatal war. We bore with the undolants, notwithstanding their departure from the precepts, until it became apparent that they were bent on the destruction of the Islamic faith. On one day they changed 21 of the most honorable and enlightened Moslems, while children, old men and delicate women were bereaved of their natural protectors and subjected to foul usage, even torture. What stronger proof of their faithlessness is needed than the bombardment of holy places, such as Abraham's tomb, and the killing of persons praying within a mosque? God has opened the way to independence and freedom for us. Our independence is complete and absolute. Our aim is preservation of Islam."
