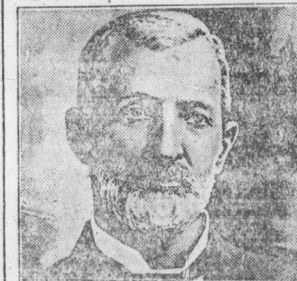

**OBITUARY**

**ARTHUR RUSSELL**  
(Union Advocate)

Arthur Russell, who went to Camp Sussex with the 12th Newcastle Field Battery, died at his home here last evening. Russell was discharged from the battery at Sussex on Saturday and his illness was so serious that Lieut. Crocker accompanied him to Newcastle on the Ocean Limited on Saturday afternoon. Dr. F. J. Desmond was called, but he entertained little hopes for his recovery. The deceased was 19 years of age and was a son of the late Mr. Everett Russell. His mother survives him. She is now Mrs. Bert Somers. A sister, Lulu, is also left to mourn. The deceased was a nephew of Ald. Samuel Russell and was a member of the Baptist church. His early death will be a great loss. The funeral will take place this afternoon at 2.30 o'clock.

**MRS. ARTHUR J. ANSLOW**

The death of Mary Elizabeth, widow of the late Arthur J. Anslow, who died in Vinal Haven, Maine, March 27th last, occurred Wednesday night at the residence of her brother, John Fallon. Deceased had been in failing health several months, and returned to Newcastle a few days after her husband's death. Mrs. Anslow was well known and popular in Newcastle and much sympathy is felt for the bereaved relatives. Deceased was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thos. B. Fallon. Her mother is still living and she is survived by three brothers, Thomas, John and James of Newcastle. Four children, Florence, Arthur, James and Ralph also survive, the oldest being seven years of age. The funeral was held on Friday, the cortege leaving Mr. Fallon's home at 2.30 o'clock for St. Mary's church where the services were conducted by the Rev. P. W. Dixon, Interment in the R. C. Cemetery.

**INVOKES NE TEMERE DECREE**

Montreal, June 20. — Mr. Charlemagne Rodder has taken charge of the case of George Howden, who seeks the annulment of his marriage, solemnized 30 years ago. He claims that his marriage is not valid, according to the Roman Catholic Church, to which his wife belongs. While Mrs. Howden, formerly Elmina Poitras, was born a Catholic, her husband was never baptized, and for that reason he claims the marriage cannot be recognized by the Church; the second reason is that the two contracting parties were married by a Protestant minister, and the third that the woman when she married was under the age of 21, and she had not the consent of her parents.

**BOAT ON FIRE**

Mr. O. W. Nordin of the Swedish Canadian Lumber Company, arrived at Richibucto on the 20th, in his yacht after a thrilling experience which he will not care to go through again, says the Richibucto Review. In some unknown way the little boat caught fire and before the flames were extinguished a hole had been burned through the side. Kerosene is used as fuel and the lives of all on board would have been lost if the fire had reached the tank in which the kerosene was stored. The flames were subdued after much hard, and tearing away some parts of the machinery put the craft out of commission. Fortunately Burns tug was in the vicinity and the Capt. saw the danger and came to the assistance of the disabled boat and towed her into New Gully. Pilot Albert Long was put on board and assisted in getting her up the river to O'Leary's wharf. Repairs will be made at Rexton.

**THE BAPTIST CONVENTION  
AND NE TEMERE DECREE**

which they must enter into an engagement.

With regard to marriage, the Decree says: "Marriage of a Protestant to a Protestant (provided they were never baptized in the Catholic church) is valid."

Mixed marriages are, theoretically at least, condemned by all churches, Catholic as well as Protestant. A Protestant who marries a Catholic in violation of the Decree Ne Temere is affected indirectly, that is, through the Catholic party, but not otherwise. If individuals contract or try to contract marriage in violation of this law, they are not doing so blindly. The Church says to the Catholic party: You have violated a grave ordinance; while thus living the Catholic cannot partake of the sacraments of the Church. The Catholic Church will willingly, gladly, heal the wound, undo the injury, if the parties concerned are so desirous. In the celebrated Helier case, the contracting parties knew perfectly that they were violating a law of the land. The officiating clergyman knew that he personally was violating the same law. The Catholic authorities at Montreal did not make all this trouble. The parties got tired of each other, wished for a divorce; and knowing how things stood with them, they went, one of them at least, to the ecclesiastical authorities and demanded an authoritative decision with regard to the validity of their marriage. This the Bishop was obliged to give. He declared the marriage canonically null. The civil authorities were then appealed to. They gave a similar decision, not because the Bishop pronounced adversely to the validity; but because such is the law of the land. Protestants should not forget that in the Province of Quebec each denomination or religious body makes its own laws, impediments and everything else connected with marriage. A Catholic can no more marry two Protestants than a Protestant clergyman can marry two Catholics. There is among some Protestants an idea that Catholics regard the marriage of Protestants as no marriage at all, such an opinion never prevailed, nor had any place, in the Catholic Church. Indeed she places a higher value on their marriages than do Protestants themselves; for Catholics look upon the marriage of baptized Protestants as a sacrament or sacramental contract, while Protestants regard their own marriage, speaking generally, as a mere civil contract.

Where then is "the encroachment on the rights and liberties of our people?" Is there any need for all the clamor, the speeches and the demonstrations? The storm, we think, is unnecessary and calculated to defeat its own purpose.
