MARKING THE

BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITS ED STATES.

The United States Surveyors Have Completed Their Tour of Inspection and Are Preparing Their Report-The Changes in the Line Between Maine and New Brunswick.

Washington, Oct. 13.-There is a dispute between the United States and Great Britain over two boundary lines, and as a work preparatory to the settlement of this controversy various engineering and surveying parties have been in the field for a year or more making surveys in the supposed vicinity of the boundary

Their labors have been completed, their reports submitted, but they decline to discuss the result of their work untili it is made public.

is made public.

United States Satisfied.

It is known, however, that these surveys have resulted in a manner satisfactory to the United States. The state-ment published that Mount St. Elias in Alaska, which has always been held to be on United States soil, has been found to be in British territory, is stated to be at least premature and made without authority, of any one in possession of the facts. The computations have not been made and until this is done the survey will not make any statement on the subject. The officers say that until the present season's work has been completed no authentic details can be presented upon which to base any calculation.

The result of the work will enable the survey to make the inter-sections of the boundary line between Alaska and British Columbia, with all the principal intest and rivers and determine the location of the principal mountains from the Portal and Canal to 141st meridian.

The other boundary in controversy is the water line between Maine and New Brunswick, formed by the St. Croix River. This river bounds the easternsmost limit of the United States, Eastport, Maine, being, on its banks, near where it enters the sea. The boundary, which is an imaginary line, follows the course of the stream, meandering in and out among the islands that are found near the mouth, of the St. Croix, and in the Atlantic nearthe mainland. Just where the line is, in certain parts, has for a long time been an open question, and the fixed determination of the line and its marking by fixed buoys is the object of these surveys. There will be some change in the boundary, but not of special importance. One place known as Pope's Folly, which is claimed by New Brunswick, has been located west of the boundary and inside the State limits of Maine. It is a small island, a mere rock, however, and from either a commercial of strategic standpoint worthless. They Claim Pope's Folly.

After these several surveying parties have compiled the results of their observations, the whole work will be arranged by the United States survey and
