ELECT IN MAY

Ten Presidents This Month Conclude Two-Year Term In Office.

UNION ANNUAL IN JUNE

Heads of Remaining Clubs Eligible For Re-Election.

Annual meetings in the 21 mothers' clubs of the city take place in May, beginning to-night, when the yearly reports will be heard and election of officers carried out at the Lorne Avenue Club.

Following the constitution of the clubs, the presidents may not hold office for longer than a two-year term. By this method it is hoped to spread the interest and responsibility of the presidency among all the members. Election is, however, only for a one-year term, and at the end of that time the officer is privileged to retire, or the club to re-elect another in her place, if this is so desired.

This year 10 local presidents complete their two-year term, and automatically retire from the running for this office. White, Victoria, May 20, and Mrs. W. S. Lowe, Worley Road, May 13. Mrs. Ellis Hodgins, president of the Broughdale Club, was elected to office only one year ago, but has signified her intention of retiring at the annual meeting this month. Officers who have held the presidency for one year only, and are eligible for re-election, are Mrs. L. E. Mayne, of Chesley Avenue, annual meeting on May 27; Mrs. W. G. Sturman, Ealing, annual on May 6; Mrs. George Bryant, Empress Avenue, May 13; Mrs. James McNiven, Hale street, May 13; Mrs. D. Wood, Knollwood Park, May 8; Mrs. J. J. Goodman, Riverview, May 6; Mrs. Arthur Kennedy, Ryerson, May 8; Mrs. Ed. Flanagan, St. Lawrence, May 20; Mrs. S. Wilson, Tecumseh, May 23. The Trafalgar club, organized a short time ago, elected officers on that occasion.

In the Union club, where the same ruling holds, the annual meeting will take place, it is expected, in June. Mrs. A. Tanner, elected president one year ago, is again eligible for membership if she desires to stand.

Household
Suggestions

CHEESE.
Keep fancy and strong-smelling cheeses wrapped in tinfoil then in waxed paper and then inside a covered crock which should be kept in a cool place.

BUREAU DRAWERS.
If you have difficulty with the drawers of your table or dresser sticking, plane them off on the sides and lower edge and then rub the surface

over which they slide with tallow or paraffin.

COOKING CEREALS.
All cereals should be stirred into boiling water and the salt should not be added at first because it hardens the cellulose.

KILLING MOTHS.
If you find moths in your upholstered

furniture, set the piece outdoors or by an open window and saturate it with gasoline. Of course, you must be careful to do this where there is no fire.

HOT MEATS.
Ham, tongue, corned beef and meats that are not to be served hot are improved by partially cooling in the water in which they are boiled.

CLEAN SURFACE.
A white oilcloth glued smoothly to one side of the molding board makes a nice clean surface for molding candies or pastries.

USE SKINS.
Instead of using the whole mushroom for soup, you can use the skins and stems only and have the rest for a meat sauce.

REMOVING STAINS.
A dresser top that has been stained white with perfume may be restored to its former color and polish by rubbing it with kerosene or with oil and turpentine.

SOFA CUSHIONS.
Sofa cushions that are intended for use should always be made of material that is easily cleaned and is pleasant to the touch.

OIL THE WRINGER.
If the wringer works with difficulty put a little kerosene oil on the cogs and work them for a few seconds then wipe and put in a few drops of machine oil.

WASHING LACE.
Wash laces, veils and delicate lace


