TO EXTEND WELCOME TO PEACE ENVOYS.
 Ottawa, May 8.—The Government will probably take action at tomorrow's meeting of the Cabinet Council to extend a fitting official welcome to the peace envoys from South America, who are to assemble at Niagara Falls, Ont., the week after next, to endeavor to settle the present embroglio between Mexico and the United States. It is recognized that the meeting of the peace ambassadors in Canada is an event of international importance. A member of the Federal Government will probably go to Niagara Falls to meet the envoys, and to extend to them every possible courtesy on behalf of the Government and the people of Canada. The envoys will also probably be invited to visit the capital as guests of the Government.

New Cure for Tuberculosis
 A new treatment for tuberculosis which, in the opinion of some of the principal experts in the disease, gives greater hope for a cure of the scourge than anything yet discovered was described to the Academy of Medicine, Paris, at a sitting last week. The new method for combating the disease is the discovery of a young Swiss biologist, Henry Spahlinger.
 The treatment as described to the Academy consists of combined intramuscular injections of antigenic solutions and of ferments, which are modified according to the condition of each patient, causes the drying up of lung cavities, and the disappearance of bacilli and stops the fever—three results which never have been obtained by any previous method for the cure of tuberculosis. The action of the injections is said to be extremely rapid on incipient cases. In several cases described to the Academy the patients were said to have been able to follow their usual occupation.

A DISASTROUS COLONIZING EXPERIMENT.
 Four years ago a Russian company undertook to establish a permanent fishing colony in Nova Zembla, and transported thither about one hundred persons—fishermen, and their families—from Archangel. The colony flourished for a time and increased in numbers. It was visited at irregular intervals by vessels of the company, which supplied the settlers with provisions and took cargoes of fish back to Russia. Last year, however, the winter set in earlier than usual and was very severe, so that vessels were prevented by the ice from carrying supplies to the fishermen. A scientific expedition which visited Nova Zembla last Summer made the shocking discovery that the whole colony had perished of hunger.

Ex-President Roosevelt is returning from his Brazilian expedition. Four almost a physical wreck, having been attacked with fever in the dense tropical growth along the Maderia river. In describing one stage of his journey through new and untravelled regions Mr Roosevelt said that for forty days he was shut in deep ravines with cliffs two to the hundred feet in height. Travel was slow and tedious. There was no sun and the expedition trudged along at a quarter of a mile daily. Fortunately, the fever attack occurred after the most perilous and difficult part of the journey was over.
