Bring to boiling point, season with salt and pepper, and thicken with four level tablespoonfuls of flour and two of butter rubbed to a smooth paste. Add one cup of green cooked peas and two tablespoonfuls mushroom catsup or lemon juice, and when serving garnish with a cup of cream, whipped.
