THE INSPIRATION OF SCRIPTURE.

Among those who believe that God is more than "the Unknowable" it is held that He reveals Himself not only in nature, and in the conscience of man, but that He has given a special revelation of Himself through certain men whom He summoned into closer intercourse than is ordinarily the ease, but most of all through Jesus Christ. The supernatural revelation was not solely for those to whom it was first given, or even to those who first heard it in spoken words from their lips. It was for all ages, and therefore demanded a written record. This record is contained in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments.
