HIGHWAY SAFETY—STATISTICS ON HIGHWAY FATALITIES

Question No. 964—**Mr. Robinson:**

1. To what extent has the number of fatalities on highways been reduced as a result of the recent changes in the Criminal Code regarding driving offences connected with alcohol?
2. How many fatalities occurred on highways for each year 1960 to 1970 inclusive, that were attributable, at least in part, to driving where alcohol was a significant factor?

Mr. Bruce Howard (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): In so far as the Dominion Bureau of Statistics is concerned: 1. This information is not available from D.B.S.

2. D.B.S. does not have information as to the number of highway fatalities in which alcohol was a significant factor. However, the following table gives the total number of fatalities for the years 1960 to 1969. Complete data for 1970 are not yet available.

Hon. Otto E. Lang (Minister of Manpower and Immigration): The Government of Canada does not make grants to industry for vocational training programs. However, under the Adult Occupational Training Act, the Minister of Manpower and Immigration may enter into a contract with any employer operating or undertaking to operate an occupational training course for the training of adults employed by the employer to provide for the payment of costs incurred in conducting the occupational training course.
