Order Paper Questions

Mr. Len Marchand (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): 1. No agreement has been reached for the establishment of a second national park in Prince Edward Island.

2. Discussions with the Province of Prince Edward Island have identified the area of East Point as having national park potential.

3. Under the normal terms of a national park agreement, the province provides a core area of approximately 25 per cent at no cost to Canada. Canada pays 50 per cent of the cost of acquiring the remaining lands.

4. Representations have been made on several occasions, the first being in 1969 and the most recent in January, 1972.

Hon. James Hugh Faulkner (Secretary of State): I am informed by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation as follows: The broadcast in question originated in Toronto. It was fed to our delay centre in Calgary for broadcast to Western regions at 10 a.m. local time. While it was being received in Calgary for recording, a break occurred in the telephone lines between Regina and Calgary, cutting off the sound portion. Alternative facilities were provided by the network carrier, Trans-Canada Telephone System, after a break of nearly two minutes. The interim was filled with music. A repeat of Her Majesty's complete message was offered the same evening.
