PROF. LOCKHART: I think that would be fairly in the total mount which is to be voted for Education and domaine of the Protestant Committee.

THE PRINCIPAL: It has been heard that that proposal is repugnant to democratic policy. PROF. LOCKHART: I don't quite see that argument. The funds, in the first place, are all democratically voted, if you look at it in that respect. The Pretestant Committee would have a budget and it delegates certain powers to other departments. I cannot see why, if the Committee is to make a direct accounting to the Government for the money it spends, this should not be.

THE PRINCIPAL: Is it fair to assume that the Government, in the preparation of its estimates, would appropriate funds to the Protestant Committee on the basis of the Protestant Committee's budget is submitted.
