Dear Lord Atholstan:

The fate of the Anti-Tuberculosis and General Health League is a matter of very vital concern to all our citizens, but particularly so to those whose interests in the public welfare enables them to appreciate what the Health League has done during the two years of its existence.

It is unnecessary for me to set forth the service the League has rendered, because I know of your keen interest in it - a not unnatural interest, since it was owing entirely to your beneficence and vision that the League was formed. It is the best example known to me of practical ideality in our country, and it is impossible to evaluate adequately the service it has already rendered or the far reaching benefits that might accrue from its future activities. The public of Montreal owe you a debt of greatititude which they can never repay and probably never will appreciate. I appeal to you to put our citizens under further debt by placing the needs of the Health League before those citizens whose interest in public welfare enables them to appreciate what the League has done and is doing. For the work of the next two years a minimum of \$120,000. is required. I have such confidence in the public spirit of Montreal that I am sure this beneficent movement will not ber permitted to lapse.
